The Rev Canon Richardson of Trinity Church St John, the Deputation appointed by the Board of Missions to visit the Deanery of Woodstock, spent the past week between New Denmark and : Catterbury, addressing meetings and preaching on the subject of Missions, and bringing forcibly the strong claim of this part of the Church's work especially the Mission of the great North West -upon the Church. On Sunday evening last the Rev gentlman occupi ed the pulpit of St Luke's, and preached to a crowded congregation from Judges V. 23. "Curse ye Meroz, curse ye bitterly the inhabitants thereof." He said that although the curse had passed away the spirit of Meroz remained and unfortunabely was to be found in the Church as well as in Politics and civic government etc that spirit was the spirit of inaction a spirit of indifference.
