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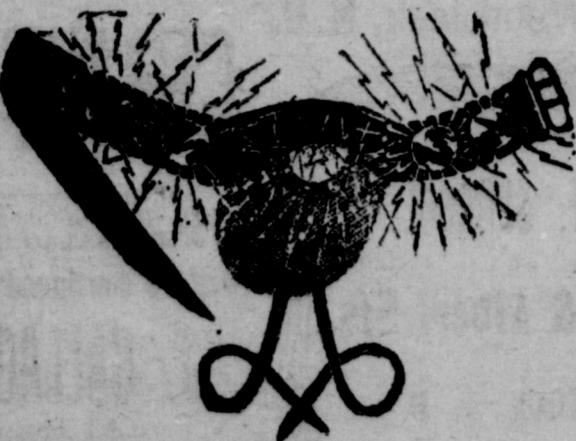

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TOWN COUNCIL.

(By our Special Reporter.)

The town fathers met in the council chamber, Friday evening, Feb 9th, the mayor presiding and the following councillors present: McManus, Leighton, Henderson, Fields and Dunbar. The minutes were read by the clerk and approved. Mayor Munro commenced the business of the evening by announcing that a delegation from the Carleton County Hospital were present to tender their report. On motion it was moved and seconded that the report be heard.

Rev G D Ireland as chairman of the delegation read the following report:—To His worship the Mayor and councillors of the town of Woodstock:—Gentlemen—The trustees of the Carleton County Hospital beg leave to submit the following report for the financial year ending the 30th of May 1905. The secretary has received during the year as follows. Balance from last year \$52.23, subscriptions and other sources \$1548.57, from the matron \$1278.46. The sum received from patients during the year amounted to \$1968.19. The actual running expenses for 12 months \$4217.88. Average expense per month \$351.49. Average expense per day \$9.63. Average expense of patients per day \$1.37. In the report, which on account of its length has not all been published, it was shown that the Hospital went behind to the amount of \$700. On reading the report Mr Ireland said:—“Gentlemen, as you all will see by the report I have just read that the institution has gone behind \$700.00 and that the work is growing and getting longer at the time and that there were a number of patients to be received for which they got nothing.” He and the delegates desired that the town would increase the grant which was \$300 to \$500.

On motion by Coun Leighton seconded by Coun Fields this was referred to the finance committee. The report of the standing committee was read by Coun Leighton. In this were bills of Wm Dibble for \$135, A B Connell for \$285, B M Colpitts for his salary which is \$100 also a bill for \$17.15.

On motion by Coun Leighton seconded by Coun Henderson the report was received and placed on file.

Moved by Coun Leighton seconded by Coun Henderson that an order be drawn on the treasury for the payment of the above bills. Carried.

Coun Leighton said that in Feb 8th 1904 A B Connell was appointed legal advisor to Scott Act inspector. He now moved that, the appointment be rescinded. The motion seconded by Coun Fields was put before the board and carried.

Coun Leighton—Your worship, lots of us feel a little tloklish in handling Scott Act matters and I move that a committee be appointed to wait upon Mr Colpitts and see what arrangement he has with the town and report to the council. This motion was seconded by Coun McManus, Carried. And the following committee was appointed, Coun McManus, Leighton and Fields.

Coun Fields—Your worship, I have a few words to say in regard to the Scott Act business. Now Mr Colpitts has had the office of inspector for the past eight or nine years and at the end of each year has come out in debt. He has had all the chances to enforce the act as vigorously as he chooses to do so. Last year the council gave him full power, told him to go ahead and enforce the act and they would stand by him and foot the bills, and at the end of the year he hands in his report with a deficit the same as usual. I believe Mr Colpitts doesn't want to put liquor down, or at least his action gives me that impression and I for one will not vote for Mr Colpitts as Scott Act Inspector any longer.

Coun Leighton—Mr Colpitts has had all the chances necessary to stop the sale of liquor or at least he might have stopped its sale on Sunday, but if you were down where I reside you would soon find out that there was as much floating on Sunday as any other time.

Mayor Munro—Whoever is inspector or whether it be Mr Colpitts or Mr Kelly I believe it would be a good idea to appoint a committee to look after the Inspector and to steer him and see that he does everything in a way that the town would receive some benefit by having a Scott Act Inspector.

On motion Coun Leighton seconded Coun Henderson the printing committee was authorized to receive tenders from the different papers in town for the printing of town matter.

Coun Leighton now read tenders from the Bank of Montreal, Bank of Nova Scotia and the Royal Bank of

Canada for the handling of the town accounts. Mr Leighton said that he had carefully perused the tenders and in his estimation the Bank of Montreal had not only the lowest tender in, but the best.

Coun Henderson—Your worship, ingratitude is a very great sin, but perhaps we are not looking at this matter from that standpoint, but from the standpoint of dollars and cents, but still, I believe the tender of the Bank of Nova Scotia should receive some consideration on our part, although it is not the lowest. The Bank of Nova Scotia has always used us all right and they carried the town accounts without any security and it is my belief that the bank accounts be left where they are.

Coun Leighton—Your worship, what Coun Henderson says about the Bank of Nova Scotia is true. They have used us very nicely and the new manager is a very nice man but I know in my private affairs I always consider it as a matter of business to trade where the best trade can be secured and I believe that is the way we all are, and if we use this caution about our own affairs I only believe it is right to use the same precaution in dealing with town affairs. He moved the Bank of Montreal receive the town account on account of putting in the best and lowest tender. This motion was seconded by Coun McManus and carried.

Moved Coun Fields seconded by Coun Leighton, the following were appointed special policemen: Neil McKinnon, Dan McIntosh, John Brown, Ban Niles, A W Fields, Wm Bolger and John Gray.

Coun Dunbar read tenders for supplying the water works with wood. On motion by Coun Leighton seconded by Coun McManus these tenders were referred to the water committee with power to act.

Coun Dunbar—The ashes at the pumping station are not removed regularly and are left lying around and I move some arrangement be made so they will be taken away regularly.

Coun McManus moved that the ashes be given to the poor farm and that he would see that they were taken away every two weeks. This motion was seconded by Coun Henderson and carried.

Then followed the reading of a number of bills which were ordered paid.

Moved by Couns Leighton seconded by Couns Henderson, Couns Leighton, McManus and Fields were appointed as a committee to act with the clerk in preparing Legislation to be presented at the present session.

On motion by Coun McManus seconded by Coun Leighton the council adjourned.

House of Assembly.

The local house met at Fredericton on Thursday of last week. Governor Snowball read the speech from the throne, which among other important measures foreshadowed the introduction of a law compelling children to attend school 120 days in each year. Owing to the fact that Hon Mr Hazen, leader of the opposition, arrived only at noon that day, speechmaking was postponed until Friday, when the address in reply to the speech from the throne was moved by Robert Murray M P P for Northumberland, seconded by Geo Robertson M P P for St John. These gentlemen were followed by Mr Hazen who made one of his rather pleasant though altogether harmless tirades against the administration.

Premier Tweedie, who replied, was in good form, and shattered the arguments made by the tory leader. Owing to the fact that Mr Flemming was not on hand with one of his gasty orations, B F Smith M P P undertook to answer the premier, but the futility of his effort was so apparent that even Mr Smith himself soon saw what he was up against, and did not pursue the matter very far. Hon Mr Farris, Robert Maxwell and others spoke, after which the address was carried. The house adjourned Friday night until Monday, most of the members going home to spend Sunday. Major Good, Captain Kirkpatrick and the men of the Field Battery who fired the salute, returned on Saturday.

We may not all live to see the day when in the fulness of time it shall return to the paths of rectitude, but history has a fashion of repeating itself.

New Telephone Connection.

Users of the Central Telephone may now converse with St John and Fredericton over the automatic instrument, the new owners of the system having come to terms with the N. B. Co. It is probable that the automatic phone will soon be installed in the C. P. R. station.

Fredericton's New P. M.

Ald. John A. Edwards has been appointed postmaster at Fredericton. He will make a good official. There were many applicants.

Coun Owens in Town.

Coun W J Owens, the genial and good looking county councillor from the parish of Wicklow was in town this week. Mr Owens says the Centreville Agricultural Society of which he is the president, is planning to hold a two days show next fall. A delegation consisting of H T Scholey and Albert Simonson went to Fredericton on Wednesday to ask for a government grant. They were well received and assured of careful consideration.

Nova Scotia and Wales.
