## MR SMITH'S SPEECH.

On Friday last Mr. Smith continued the debate. He said I congratulate the mover and seconder of the address on the manner in which they discharged their task and I defend the members of the opposition against the angry attacks of the premier today who charged them with going around the country trying to extract information as to public affairs. Does not the Premier know the statement in the speech from the throne as to the dairying conditions in the province is a falsehood?

Hon. Mr. Tweedie raised the point of order that it was unparliamentary to charge that any paragraph in the speech was false.

Mr. Smith—I disclaim all intention of infringing parliamentary rules. I was going on to show that dairying was in a deplorable state, and the commissioner of agriculture must support my statement that the man at the head of our dairying last year was actually working in the interest of an Ontario Cream Separator concern. Taking up the Sussex investigation, Mr. Smith charged pressure had been brought to bear on Mr. Eveleigh to retract his statements—a matter in which the first minister was interested.

Hon. Mr. Tweedie again called Mr. Smith to order.

Mr. Smith—You agreed to retain Mr. Eveleigh for some months.

Hon. Mr. Tweedie—I had nothing to do with the settlement.

Mr. Smith—You knew these negotiations were going on?

Hon. Mr. Tweedie—Certainly.

Mr. Smith—Then you were a party to keeping Eveleigh from June till October.

Hon. Mr. Tweedie again rose to the point of order. He had not claimed the right to appoint or discharge Mr. Eveleigh.

Mr. Smith—Mr. White, as counsel for the dairy commissioners claimed they had the right under the act to dismiss or retain Mr. Eveleigh.

Continuing Mr. Smith said reference was made in the speech to illustration orchards, a paragraph in which the composers thereof exhausted their conscience. The paragraph says these orchards were doing "extremely well". Does not every cabinet minister know this is not true? Why the trees are nearly all dead. A few weeks ago I visited the illustration orchard at Florenceville, but could not tell how many trees had been set out there. I think out of all the trees, 200 or more, there are only 24 standing alive and they are wrapped in cotton wool and may not stand the winter.

Hon. Mr. Tweedie—You are lumbering this winter?

Mr. Smith—Yes, but I am not getting much benefit from your reforesting policy. I have a right to criticize the acts of the government, be they with regard to lumber or apples or dairy products. Take the highway act for example, and look at the floods of protests it has drawn out from municipal councils and the interested public. As a member of the opposition I would vote to repeal that act even if my constituents did not agree with me. The time will come when the Premier would find himself weighed in the balance, and found wanting.

## HON MR FARRIS

said that only 100 trees were set out by the department at Florenceville, but 100 more had been put there by a private party. They had about all fared badly. Not so, however, in other parts of the province. In Charlotte only one tree died, also only one in Queens and in many sections they did admirably. The object was to find what trees would stand our climate and pay to plant. The trees killed would be replaced by more hardy varieties and the farmers would thus know what kinds to cultivate to advantage. The government had not the power to dismiss a man under contract with the Sussex Dairy Co.

Mr. Smith reiterated his former statement, whereupon Hon. Mr. Farris again contradicted it, and said that if the dairy industry in Carleton Co. was not as prosperous as hoped for, it was largely due to the farmers selling too much off their land and not keeping enough stock. Next year, however more cream would go to Woodstock than ever before.

Mr. Smith—What is to become of the skimming stations?

Mr. Farris—We cannot force people to use them. As for the highway act it was growing in popularity as it became understood. In Queens Co., where a protest was raised against it last year, not a single voice was heard in its denunciation at the county council board.

After some observations by Mr. Maxwell, the address was adopted.


