## THE BAPTIST CONVENTION

The Baptist Convention held last week in St. John unanimously re-elected Rev Dr Jos McLeod as moderator.

One of the most important measures to come before the Conference was the report of a committee appointed to draw up a salary plan. The report aimed at the benefitting of those ministers whose salaries are small, while those getting \$1,000 or \$1,500 per year are unaffected. The report was titled "The Minimum Salary Plan," and consisted of several sections. The most important sections follow, viz.:

That the said minimum salaries shall be as follows, namely, on ordinary pastorates \$500, and on special pastorates \$550. In cases of unmarried pastors the said minimum salary shall increase ten dollars each succeeding year for ten years from the time this plan goes into force until said minimum salary shall amount to the sum of \$600 on ordinary pastorates, and to \$650 on special pastorates. And in case of married pastors and widowers with children living with them, such salaries shall increase twenty dollars each succeeding year, as aforesaid, until they shall amount to \$700 on ordinary pastorates and \$750 on special pastorates. In addition to abovementioned minimum salaries, there shall be an allowance for recent actually paid by married pastor or widower as aforesaid (not exceeding in any one year the sum of forty dollars), and to all pastors these shall be an allowance of sixty dollars per year for keeping a horse if one be kept, and in the opinion of said committee one is necessary. These allowances to be deducted from the gross local receipts on salary account in order to ascertain the "local salary."

In order to provide such minimum salaries, the said association shall create a fund, to be known as the "Supplemental Fund," to be under the management of the said committee, namely, the Home Mission committee, appointed by United Baptist Churches of New Brunswick, and to be raised in the following manner, namely: By grants from the Home Mission contributions of the churches, Sunday schools and societies; by grants from the Association Fund, and by voluntary offerings, donations, gifts and bequests from churches, Sunday schools, societies and individuals.

Subject to the approval of the said committee, any pastor whose gross local receipts on salary account amount to \$400, or whose gross local receipts and Home Mission grant amount to said sum, shall upon application be entitled to participate in said fund upon his complying with all regulations governing or relating to the same which the said committee shall from time to time enact, provided, however, that said committee can at any time for any cause they deem sufficient remove the name of any pastor off the list of those entitled to participate in said fund.

Pastors entitled to participate in said fund shall receive therefrom sufficient to pay their deficiencies in salaries in full, but if the said fund be not sufficient to pay them in full, then they shall be paid pro rata according to such deficiency than \$100 shall be allowed in the first distribution of said fund; and if after making said first distribution there still remains any sum in said fund the balance so remaining shall be paid to those pastors still having a deficiency in salary pro rata according to their deficiencies.

It shall be the duty of said committee, and they are hereby authorized to make from time to time regulations governing or relating to the distribution of the fund, etc.

This plan shall go into operation December 1st, 1906.

The report was unanimously adopted excepting the section as regards the minimum salary. An amendment was put and seconded that the minimum salary start at \$600, exclusive of house rent or expenses of keeping a horse, but this was defeated, and the report as submitted adopted.

Another interesting feature was the presentation of the report on the statistical state of the denomination in New Brunswick, the first report of its kind made since the meeting of the two Baptist bodies of last year. The total strength of the Baptists in New Brunswick, including some 5,000 non residents, was given as 58,958. The report by district is as follows:

Number one, including Madawaska, Victoria and the parishes of Wicklow and Kent, in Carleton county, reports 59 churches, 29 baptisms, three received on experience and 21 by letter. Total membership, 1,227.

Number two, the remainder of Carleton county, reports 35 churches 137 baptisms, 16 received on experience, 25 by letter—a total of 3,820.

Number three, York county, reports 40 churches, 160 baptisms, 29

## MAN KILLED BY LIGHTNING

Tragic Death of Ludlow Nase, at Welsford, Kings County.

Ludlow Nase, of Nerepis, was struck by lightning in the Orange Hall at Welsford on Thursday evening, and instantly killed. The tragedy took place about midnight, when upwards of one hundred persons were in the hall. When the lightning struck the building all the lamps were extinguished, and there was great confusion. Consequently, it was not until some minutes later that the deceased, who was the son of Mr and Mrs Henry Nase, of Nerepis, was found lying on the floor of an ante-room. Dr Arnold was brought to the hall at once, but Mr Nase was beyond human aid. This morning his body was taken to the home of his parents.

Mr D L Stewart, of Welsford, who was one of those in the hall at the time of the accident, was seen by the Globe this morning. The lightning, he said, struck the flag-pole of the building, ran down through the front hall and after going through the floor tore a hole through the rear of the structure. At the time Mr Stewart said further, Mr Nase and Mr P McDonald were together in the ante-room. Mr McDonald received a very severe shock, but happily escaped the fate of his companion. Other persons in the hall, including some of the ladies, also received shocks, but none of these were very severe. Mr Stewart himself had an experience which he does not wish repeated. A hole was burned in his trousers and his leg did not escape, a rather nasty burn being made. As soon as possible after the shock the lamps of the hall were lighted again, and several of the men entering the ante-room, found Mr Nase lying on the floor devoid of all signs of life. One drove quickly for Dr Arnold, but, as already stated, the doctor could do nothing.

Needless to say, the tragic affair not only brought the dance to a sudden termination, but it has also cast a very deep gloom over Welsford and Nerepis, where the deceased was so well known and respected. Strange to say, Mr Stewart stated, there was not a single mark on the body of the deceased.

Mr Nase was about thirty years of age. He was a widower, his wife, who, before marriage was a Miss Lingley, having died a comparatively short time after her marriage. During Thursday afternoon Mr Nase was in attendance at the Orange demonstration at Welsford.

The front of the hall was considerably damaged. Contrary to fears when the lightning struck the building it did not catch fire, though many of the dancers—expecting that a blaze would instantly break out—ran from the building.

It is not probable that an inquest will be deemed necessary. *Globe.*
