AS TO COALITION.

Onlooker, in merry mood, in the New Freeman, pictures Hon Mr Tweedie and Mr Hazen gazing forlornly at the rising wave of provincial indebtedness and saying to each other, in effect:

"Either of us alone is as helpless as Canute of old. This swelling tide will overwhelm the province. Let us unite our forces and sweep it back into the depths."

There is nothing wrong with Onlooker's argument that the best men of both parties would make a very strong combination; although either party would doubtless contend that it is now stronger in governmental capacity than if it joined hands with members of the other party; unless the latter came around to its way of thinking, in which case there would still be the same old parties, with a difference in personnel.

It seems to the Times that if certain reforms are needed, the thing to do is to convince the people that one party will institute them, and trust the people to give that party its mandate. If neither of the present parties can do what Onlooker contends should be done, a coalition would hardly be more successful. Moreover, if the people were profoundly convinced that great reforms are needed they would give Mr Hazen a little more help. The people would very properly resent the attempt on the part of any coalition to make them do something they were not convinced should be done.

Any appeal, therefore, it seems to us, should be to the people. When they state their wants the politicians will be found quick to respond.

THE KING AND CANADA.

The answer of his Majesty the King to the invitation of both Houses of the Dominion Parliament to visit Canada has been received with genuine regret and disappointment by the Canadian people. That the answer has been in the negative is in no sense due to any lack of interest on the part of the Sovereign in the welfare of the great Dominion which has made such marvelous strides since the days when he visited it as Prince of Wales, nor from any want of appreciation of the spirit of affectionate loyalty in which the invitation was conceived. Like his predecessor Queen Victoria, King Edward has been fully imbued with a sense of the responsibility of the Sovereign House towards the whole of its vast dominions, and has constantly encouraged the heir to the throne and other members of the Royal family to visit even the most distant portions of the Empire. The obstacles to the Canadian visit, indeed, have been of a purely practical nature. The current business of the Empire imposes a burden upon the Sovereign which is already heavy enough in itself and leaves little time or strength for a journey which would almost inevitably be prolonged considerably beyond the length of his Majesty's ordinary visits to the Continent for health and recreation, and which would undoubtedly involve a great deal of physically exhausting work. It would be difficult to resist the pressure to extend the visit from one part of Canada to another. And, when once the visit had been accomplished, it would be no less difficult for the King to decline an invitation to visit some remoter portion of the Empire, such as Australia, or India, in circumstances still more fatiguing and involving even more serious interruption of the ordinary duties of State. These are weighty considerations, and it would be impossible for us to doubt their conclusiveness in present conditions. We are glad to note, nevertheless, that the latter portion of the message holds out a slight hope that possibly on some future occasion the present difficulties may be overcome. The sentiment of loyalty to the Crown which personifies the higher unity of the Empire has throughout been an important factor in preserving the Empire from disintegration. It was the factor, indeed, to which Canada, the home of the exiled United Empire Loyalists, owed its existence in the past and the maintenance of its integrity against aggression from without and disunion within. That sentiment would gain enormously in strength by such a recognition as would be afforded it by the Sovereign's personal visit. And so we may venture to express the hope that obstacles which have proved too serious on this occasion may yet at some future date be surmounted.—London Times

A KILOWATT.

As some of the citizens and town councillors claim to be mixed up over the definition of a kilowatt, we will come to the rescue. In the first place a kilowatt is merely a thousand watts. A watt is the practical electrical unit of the rate of working in a circuit, being the rate when the electromotive force is one volt and the intensity of current one ampere. Thus a watt when mathematically expressed is equivalent to .00134 of one horsepower. A kilowatt is consequently 1.34 horsepower. As only a very few know what a horsepower really is, we will add that it is the standard theoretical unit of work, equivalent to the force necessary to be used in lifting 33,000 lbs one foot high in one minute.

DEATH OF DAVID GIBSON.

David Gibson, one of the best known men in the lower end of the county, passed away at his home, Northampton, on Monday, aged 78 years and 9 months.

The immediate cause of death was pneumonia, but for some time he had been gradually sinking. He is survived by a widow, formerly Miss Augusta Rogers, and five children—four sons and a daughter. The late Mr Gibson was for practically his whole life actively engaged in farming, lumbering and milling, in which callings he was notably successful. For thirty years he was honored by his native parish with a seat in the Council, and for a term filled the warden's chair. He was a good neighbor, a kind-hearted employer, and retained in an eminent degree the confidence of all who knew him. In political matters he was a conservative. He was also actively connected with the Orange Order. The funeral services, largely attended, took place on Tuesday, conducted by Rev E O Turner, with interment at Greenbank Cemetery.

A Winnipeg despatch of last Wednesday, says:—"During the last two days Sir William Van Horne has been smashing railway records. This evening his special train came in from Brandon, a distance of 134 miles under two hours, an average speed of 67 miles an hour. At one time the speed indicator registered 79.4 miles per hour, for a stretch. A distance of 30 miles west of Portage La Prairie was covered in 23 minutes, an average speed of 78 miles per hour. Tuesday Sir William established the long distance speed record for western lines, his train making the run between Moose Jaw and Winnipeg, 400 miles, in eight hours flat. On board these trains were Sir Wm Van Horne, Second Vice-President Whyte, Cobello, New York agent, Superintendent G J Bury and District Superintendent J T Arundel. Today's is said to be the record for this continent."

Houlton, Aug. 6.—Excellent progress is being made by the Committee having in charge the plans for the proposed woollen mill. One of the committee informs us that \$50,000 has already been subscribed by different ones, and this is only a starter. In addition to this amount a money land necessary for all mill purposes has been offered by Hon A A Burleigh. The subscriptions so far have been from men who have each given \$5,000. There are many others who have signified their intention of contributing liberally. It is thought \$100,000 will be easily raised from among our citizens. A general mass meeting will be called later when the progress of the committee and their plans will be made known.

General Oku has become chief of the general staff of the army of Japan. Oku commanded the army in Manchuria at the beginning of the war and conducted the operations that forced the Russians out of Korea and cut off Port Arthur. He was one of Oyama's principal lieutenants in the fighting that ended in the capture of Mukden and compelled Russia to make peace on terms advantageous to Japan. He steps into big shoes and will probably fill them. The Japan system seems to weed out inferior men before they get dangerously near the top.
