THE RAILWAY.

Says the Fredericton Gleaner:—"In answer to a question by Mr. Crockett, M. P., Premier Laurier has given the comparative distances by the so-called Central route and the River Valley route. According to the engineers, there is a seeming advantage of seventeen miles in favor of the Central route, but no sane person would argue from that slight difference that that route would be most advantageous for the purposes for which the road is to be built. The immense difference in grades and curves must be looked at, and in this comparison there is unanimity of opinion that the valley route has an advantage which cannot be successfully overcome even by the expenditure of vast sums in the way of rock cutting. Again, the route along the St. John is already peopled by a prosperous community of intelligent farmers, whose transportation facilities have been utterly neglected in the past, and who look to the Government road for that full measure of prosperity which they should rightly enjoy. On the other hand the Central route is projected through a comparatively barren region in which the plough share of the agriculturist is not to be found and which is likely to remain in the same condition for years to come. Look at it as we may there can be no comparison between the merits of the rival routes. Still it will not do for the people of the River country to lay back and expect to have the road brought to their doors without an effort upon their part. Many in fluence are at work to keep the line away from Fredericton, and so bring it into close proximity to the winter port at St. John. The inhabitants of this and adjoining counties must exert any and every influence which can be brought to bear upon the Government to force them to do no only what is in the interests of the people living along the River, but the best interests of the country at large."

WORK FOR BRO COLPITTS.

Benjamin Feeley of the Custom House force made two seizures between this village and the Boundary Line last Sunday. There were two teams containing three men each and eight quart bottles of liquor. The parties who were seized allowed that they bought the liquor in Carleton County, N. B., of one Jake Wise. Jake Wise! Let us see where have we seen this name before? A man by this name used to sell liquor in this town some years ago. Later he went to the border, built a house on the line dividing this government from the Canadian government. Later he was arrested by the United States officials for defrauding the U. S. government, taken to Bangor for trial and let off on the promise of good behavior. He failed to keep his word, was afterward arrested and carried to Portland and tried for the same offense, convicted and sentenced to one year and three days in States prison. From this sentence he appealed to the Circuit Court of Appeals and gave bonds for his appearance at this court some time in June. He now seems to be doing a thriving business in Carleton County, N. B. We are wondering just how long the provincial officials will allow Wise to remain on their soil and do business in violation of their laws. We wish to say to our neighbors that he is beyond our jurisdiction and it is now up to you to say whether he can sell rum in a prohibition county like yours or not. Get on your job, gentlemen.—(Houlton Times)

TRUSTS MUST TELL SECRETS

That the government of the United States under the constitution has complete power over the great modern corporations known as trusts and that their officials may be compelled to answer any and all questions concerning trust methods is the chief opinion rendered by the highest judicial tribunal, the supreme court at Washington.

Two cases were involved, the first being that against the Tobacco trust whose agents and officers had refused to answer questions before a grand jury, and the second against the paper trust, whose officers refused to show books and answer questions before the government examiner. This decision is expected to give instant vitality to all of the antitrust laws that have been enacted and to enable the department of justice to obtain all the evidence it needs in the enforcement of the laws. The court holds that corporations, being creations of the law, have no immunity under the constitution. As individuals the officers may claim immunity if their testimony tends to incriminate, but their testimony may be used against any of their associates who are not compelled to testify. Corporations retain their rights only so long as their act are lawful. Thus the beef packers, regardless of promises from Garfield, can be taken before a grand jury and compelled to disclose their secrets, while the Rockefeller and Roger's trust must answer themselves as to their affairs on demand of the courts. Prosecutions will be radically changed. The power of supervision belongs to the creator of the corporation, whether state or nation.

A New Treatment of Pain.

The February American Inventor describes a novel method of treating pain by an electro-magnetic apparatus which has been recently developed in Switzerland. The hands of the patient are tied to tubes of zinc filled with salt solution and the bottom being perforated and covered with a bladder to assure good contact. The head of the patient is surrounded by an alternating magnetic field of high frequency. During treatment there is an increase in the body's resistance and the patient becomes free from pain. At the same time the apparatus records the degree of resistance.

Oyster Soup.

One quart oysters, 4 cups milk, 1 slice onion, 2 stalks celery, 2 blades mace, sprig of parsley, bit of bay leaf, 1 1/2 cup butter, 1 1/2 cup flour, salt and pepper. Clean and pick over oysters as for oyster stew; reserve liquor, add oysters slightly chopped, and heat slowly to boiling point. Strain through cheese cloth, re-heat liquor and thicken with butter and flour cooked together. Scald milk with onion, celery, mace, parsley, and bay leaf; remove seasoning and add to oyster liquor. Season with salt and pepper.

Supreme Court Aids Caleb Powers.

A fourth trial in the courts of Kentucky for Caleb Powers on the charge of complicity in the murder of Geobel is the decision of the United States supreme court. Nevertheless the character of the decision is distinctly encouraging to this accused Kentuckian, who has spent seven years in jail and must now face a fourth trial in a hostile court. The decision points the way to an appeal to the supreme court from any unjust decision in Kentucky. Commenting on the Kentucky trials, Justice Harlan says that they make an exhibit of misconduct which may well shock lovers of justice. It was in 1899 that Powers was elected secretary of state for Kentucky on the Republican ticket, when Geobel, the contesting candidate for governor, was shot in front of the capitol at Lexington Governor Elect Taylor who left the state after the killing, has never returned. Powers was not in Lexington at the time of the assassination.

BRITANNIA RULES

(From the New York Sun)

Whenever an enthusiastic American feels like letting the eagle scream he ought to read the reports of what other countries, particularly Great Britain, are doing in the way of ship building for ocean trade and naval protection. He ought to compare the exhibit with what we are not doing along the same line. Take Lloyd's annual summary of British shipbuilding in 1905, for instance. Half an hour's perusal of that document and there will not be much eagle screaming. Here is the British record for 1905:

Merchant steamers.....	737	1,604,696
Merchant sailors.....	58	18,372
Tot merchant additions 795		1,633,068
Warships	23	129,801
Total ships built	823	1,762,869

The mere increase of the output of merchant ships in 1905 over 1904 was 118,000 tons nearly half as much as the entire American ocean-going merchant fleet, and the highest on record.

Test the Cows.

If you test your cows one day each week during the milking period, and on the same day of the week, or will test them, say for a week, when they have been in milk for a month, and take this for an average of nine weeks, four weeks before the week test and four after, you will find out enough about your cows to induce you to make more full and complete tests hereafter.

If, however, you will not go to the trouble of getting a Babcock test, you certainly can get yourself a pair of scales, a piece of paper, a pencil and a Mason fruit jar, with some tablets—to be had at any drug store—to drop into the jar to keep your milk from souring. Put into this jar a gill of milk from each milking, after it is thoroughly stirred. Do this a week and send it to your creamery, whether you sell your milk locally or at a distance, and have them find out for you the per cent. of butter-fat. If you have the pounds and per cent., your small boy will tell you how much butter-fat there is in your milk. You are not doing a safe business if you undertake to sell milk without knowing what it is worth on the market.—(Wallace Farmer)

Wellman's Polar Plans.

Walter Wellman, the newspaper man and polar explorer who expects soon to try for the north pole in a \$75,000 airship constructed under the direction of Santos Dumont, has just returned from Paris, where the airship is being constructed. The ship will be 190 feet long, with a maximum width of 49 feet and the bag will contain 220,000 feet of hydrogen gas with a lifting power of 16,300 pounds. There will be three motors with combined energy of seventy horsepower, and the weight will be 7,000 pounds. The start is to be made from North Spitzbergen. A speed of eleven or twelve miles an hour may be averaged. The balloon's buoyancy is expected to last twenty-five days, and sledges and motors will be carried. Mr. Wellman thinks that under favorable conditions they may reach the pole in forty-five hours, but they will take provisions to last for seventy-five days. They will have facilities for inflating the bag repeatedly.
