THE REASON WHY.

We are a day late this week owing to the fact that the copy for Engineer Barbour's Report did not reach us until the usual hour of going to press. It was the special request of the committee that it be printed in this issue. In order to oblige the citizens in general we consented, hence the slight delay.

Calling for Tenders

At a meeting of the Water and Electric Light Committees held on Monday evening, a majority of those present decided to issue a call for Tenders under certain unusual conditions, in many ways, it seems to us, utterly at variance with the best interests of the town. Perhaps the greatest objection is to be found in the arbitrary fixing of thirty arc lights as the number that will be tendered upon for the street lighting. When there are forty-eight places where lights have been placed already, why do the gentlemen issuing the call narrow the limit to thirty arc lights? Will Councillor Dunbar or Councillor Fisher please explain which portions of the town they intend to consign to outer, if not utter darkness? In our humble opinion forty lights is the minimum with which the citizens will be at all satisfied, and even fifty would be more nearly adequate. We do not think the council in any event should consider less than forty. We are sure no person will be satisfied with thirty. The more the matter is looked into, the stronger becomes our belief that the action of these town fathers is quite hasty, and should be most carefully considered by the full board at Monday's meeting. In the first place we doubt the existence of any authority for their action. Certainly it was not conferred upon them by any motion at the last session of the council. At that meeting it seemed to be the impression that Barbour's report would be fully considered before any action should be taken. In fact the motion of Coun McManus to that effect was duly passed. There are a great many points in this call for tenders to which the citizens will take exception. For instance why is it necessary to ask any company tendering for the town pumping, to purchase a motor pump? The town corporation can borrow money just as easily as any company. If we put either of the likely bidders to this expense we may be sure they will charge cracking good interest on their outlay, and the ratepayers will get it in the same old place. In any case the cost will not exceed \$5000, and for the life of us we cannot see what is to be gained by the proposition of the two Committees. We have our doubts about this call for tenders. It seems to us there is undue haste in some person's behalf. Our advice to the citizens is to watch the council. We strongly advise the board to go slow. It is too important a matter to be hastily carried through or lightly considered. It seems to us the present call for tenders needs considerable amendment.
