No one can deny that Lord Elgin, the new Colonial Secretary, was born in Montreal, but we do nat see why that should be used to prejudice him in the eyes of the Empire at the present juncture. He bore himself while Viceroy of India with great dignity and sagacity and his term of office is not associated with anything that lacks wisdom and statesmanship. Lord Elgin nobly declined to respond to the insidious influences of the year and place of his nativity. He has proved to the world that a man may be born in Montreal and by careful attention to duty and a strict avoidance of mobs and annexationmongers grow up a useful and respected citizen. If by some strange mischance the new Under Secretary for the Colonies, Mr Winston Churchill, had come from Montreal there might be grounds for dread apprehension, but his characteristics being thoroughly homebred the outlook is favorable.

LORD ROSEBERY GRATIFIED

Lord Rosebery, addressing the

Council of the Liberal League in London on the 11th inst, referred to the change of Government. He congratulated the Prime Minister on the position he had achieved, a position which was entirely his due in respect of his long fidelity to and his continuous exertions on behalf of the Liberal party. He also welcomed the infusion of young and fresh blood in the Government, and especially congratulated the four vicepresidents of the League on their inclusion in the Cabinet. He still adhered to his interpretation of Sir Henry Campbell Bannerman's Stirspeech, and urged that if there had been any misunderstanding on his part the Liberal leader could easily have cleared it away. The presence of the four vice-presidents of the League in the Cabinet showed, however, that they had received assurances on the point, and, sweeping aside the Bodmin speech altogether, he appealed to all members of the party to use every effort to secure for the present Government such a majority at the coming election as would not only render them independent of the Irish party, but would ensure a complete and decisive victory for the cause of

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
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
