The Road Superintendents.

Considerable friction was only to be expected before the New Highway Act became well understood. It was so in the case of the Free Schools Act, and all new legislation affecting practically the whole population. Now that the Road Law is getting to be better known, it is acknowledged to be a good one in princi le. Any complaints are due almost wholly to misconception concerning its administration. Some people seriously contend that the Superintendents are growing rich with their fees. This is not true. The law allows these officials only ten per cent for supervision and \$2 a day for time actually spent in manual labor while working on the road.

It is plain from this that no Superintendent is robbing the parish. The best evidence is the fact that several of them are anxious to throw up their position, alleging as the main excuse that the remuneration is inadequate. In the South Richmond out. In addition he did some manual labor; but even then did not average a hired man's wages for the total number of days he was actually employed in the discharge of his duties. This is only one instance of several that we could quote.

Ezra Briggs acted as Chairman, and first introduced Hon Mr Jones, who spoke upwards of an hour, devoting the time mainly to an explanation of the Highway Act. He was followed by Mr Tilley in a half hour address, chiefly on the agricultural policy of the government. Coun Bell, George L Gartley, F I Wilmot Watson and other local men made brief speeches. Wilmot Watson and George L Gartley were unanimously elected delegates to the nominating convention. Richmond is prepared to roll up an old time majority for the Liberal ticket.
