OTTAWA, Dec 20.—Sir Frederic Borden, on behalf of the Dominion Government, supported a resolution, that grants of Dominion lands should be set apart for those who took part in the South African war of 1899-1902 residing in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta at the time of enlistment. Col Hughes spoke in support of the resolution, pointing to the valuable services rendered to Canada by the Canadian contingents.

Telephones for Country Towns and Farmers in Australia.

In country towns exchanges are being opened for two or more subscribers, exclusive services, constructed entirely by the Commonwealth Postal Department, the service being obtainable within small townships for £4 (\$19.47) per annum, or a party line service a slow as £2 10s. (\$12.16), while for farmers' lines—lines extending beyond town boundaries and constructed partly by Postal Department and partly by the users—even lower rates are offered. By five or six persons joining on one line a payment of £2 9s (\$11.95) or £2 6s 8d (\$11.60) will obtain full exchange service, free telephoning of telegrams over the subscribers' lines and free intercommunication with other instruments on the same wire.

London, Ont, Dec 20.—At a largely attended meeting of the South London Liberal Club the following resolution was unanimously passed: "That this meeting of members of the Liberal Club of South London desires to express its sympathy with Hon C S Hyman in this season of illness, and to assure him of its earnest desire for his speedy recovery. It would also express its unabated confidence in his integrity and uprightness as a public man and as the leader of his party in this city, and pledges itself to continue its energetic support in the future."

Poverty of a Millionaire.

Most persons, in the opinion of The Rochester Post-Express, would be willing to change unhappiness for an income of \$2,384,000, but one man, we are told, finds it impossible to pay his bills on this amount. King Edward VII., who received from the State this stipend, has trouble to "make both ends meet." The Post-Express tells us of his case:—

Out of this amount he has to maintain a number of castles and royal residences, support a small army of retainers and flunkies, and pension old and faithful servants. Consequently, when the year's bills are paid his Majesty has no money to put in the bank against a rainy day. Recently the King petitioned to have his salary raised to \$3,000,000 a year, but owing to the heavy taxation the Government refused the request.

Compared with the other rulers, Edward VII. is poorly paid. The Czar of Russia has a total income of \$20,000,000 a year. The Sultan of Turkey manages to get along on \$10,000,000. Emperor William supports the royal family on an income of about \$4,000,000. The King of Italy lives on \$10,000,000. The King of Italy exists comfortably on an income of \$2,559,500, while the Emperor of Austria-Hungary gets along on \$3,700,000. Other sums paid to European Sovereigns are:—Bavaria, \$1,242,726; Belgium, \$665,000; Denmark, \$240,000, and \$28,000 to the heir apparent; France, \$288,000; Greece, \$260,000; Netherlands, \$246,000; Portugal, \$567,000; Roumania, \$201,482; Saxony, \$628,460; Spain, \$1,430,000, and Wurtemberg, \$403,438. Compared with these sums the yearly salary of the President of the United States is very modest indeed. Furthermore, the President earns his salary, which cannot be said of many of the rulers mentioned in the list.


