SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST

HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS.

Any even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, excepting 8 and 36, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres, more or less. Entry must be made personally at the local and office for the district in which the land is situated. The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans:
(1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.
(2) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of the homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such persons residing with the father or mother.
(3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of the land entered, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land.
Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of intention to apply for patent.

LOUISA, Dec 10—There have been interesting and exciting developments in the quarrel between the House of Commons and the House of Lords during the last few days. The Herald's forecast on the subject three weeks ago proved perfectly accurate.

A week ago Mr. Lloyd George spoke in such a way that the prospects of compromise in the education question seemed very dim indeed, but he was not accepted as the accredited representative of his colleagues in the Cabinet. Since then, however, the Prime Minister had practically closed the door ever; the Prime Minister has declared war to knife against the House of Lords and has practically the door on compromise. He has described the upper chamber as the instrument of unionism, and some of the leading radical papers are asking for the destruction of the instrument which is being preserved in order to murder and mutilate liberal legislation. The House of Lords, they say, has paralysed liberal effort too long and has loaded dice against one party and loaded them in favor of other people.

"If it is to be a fight between the two houses it will be a fight to the last," says Mr. Balfour.

The Lords are anxious that the Prime Minister should appeal to the country on the question of their abolition, but that appeal is not yet. It will be after some home rule bill of next session has been rathlessly thrown out. The power of the peers

can neither be mended nor ended without a definite mandate from the people.

The nationalist members of the House of Commons are nearly all Roman Catholics, and on the Education bill they are not with the government. It will be different when the home rule bill is questioned before parliament.

CONCERNING MR. O'CONNOR.

There have been persistent rumors since his successful trip to America that Mr. T. P. O'Connor will soon be chosen leader of the nationalists and take the principal part in the agitation against the Lords. I am in a position to say that the rumors with regard to the leadership are unfounded. Mr. T. P. O'Connor's plan and ambitions do not at all conflict with those of his colleagues and do not indeed bear any appreciable relation to Ireland whatever.

If there are men so constituted as to believe that Ireland is a place to live in and to cherish a passion for being mixed up in her affairs, Mr. O'Connor is far too much a citizen of the world to dispute with them. He will even go with them and sit on their committees so long as doing so fits in with his more important avocations. He may, however, engage in the political pastime of things at the House of Lords when that assembly throws out the next home rule bill.

Russia Predominates in Persia.

Russia at the present moment, says The Novoe Vremya of St. Petersburg, occupies a predominating trading position in the Persian markets. This, however, the journal adds, has only happened in the last few years, and is mainly due to the friendly intercourse established between the two countries. Ten years ago the Russian imports into Persia amounted only to about 15 per cent of those of Great Britain. Now, however, Russia actually imports more than England does, and the imports of the latter country are steadily diminishing. The reason for this is not far to seek: Russia influence is now supreme in northern Persia. A new railway line for Russian commerce has also been opened, facilitating the communication between the two countries and enabling Russians to complete successfully with other commercial competitors.

The first section of this line, Tiflis-Alexandropol, was opened as far back as 1899. A second section, Alexandropol-Erivan, was then opened in 1902, whilst the third section, Erivan Nakechevan-Julfa to the Persian frontier, has recently been completed.

In this way a continuous line has been constructed connecting central Russia with Persia, running through Rostof, Petrosk-Baladjar and Tiflis. The distance from St. Petersburg by this new railway is about 3,000 miles, and from Moscow about 2,600, or six days' journey. This new line, of course, very much shortens the time formerly required for the journey via Baku or Petrosk, as it obviates the necessity of a long caravan journey. It is now proposed to extend this new line from Julfa through Persian territory as far as Tabriz, the Moscow of Persia, and by far the largest trading centre of that country. The surveys for this railway were made by Russian engineers in 1900-01 at the same time as those for the Alexandropol-Julfa line, and the intimate relations at present existing between the two countries render the realization of the scheme only a matter of time, as the construction of the final link in the chain of communication has already been begun. The Russian Government hopes to have the line completed and in through working order early next year. It will be extremely interesting to see which extraneous power (if any) is to predominate in the commerce of the kingdom of the Shah.

The dragoman of the British Consulate at Bagdad explained that the name of Armenia on a map is forbidden in Turkey.
