Make Them Safe.

(From the Toronto Telegram.)

The factor of safety in railway travel
has been increased by double
tracks that eliminate the possibility
of head-on collisions. It has been
still further increased by precautions
against rear-end collisions. Could
it not be still further increased by a
system of carrying two empty bag-
gage vans between the locomotive
and passenger coaches of trains that
are made up for speed. High speed
inevitably increases the chance that
the locomotive may leave the track.
Modern conditions demand high
speed, even if the boon has to be
purchased at the awful price paid in
Salisbury. Fast trains should be
made with an eye to the ever-pres-
ent possibility that the locomotive
may leave the rails. Accidents
must happen, but if the initial vel-
ocity of the shock at Salisbury had
spent its force on empty baggage
vans, there would have been fewer
lives lost in the passenger coaches.
