The leader will be welcome. Bigger and better men of the conservative faith, Tupper, Tilley and Borden, have spoken in vain to the solid men of Carleton. But Mr Hazen will not be after converts. He will speak only to the faithful.

OBITUARIES.

At Woodstock Road, Car Co, Mar 27th, 1906, Sherman E Esty, in the sixty third year of his age. Deceased was born in Jacksonstown, N.B., and is survived by a wife, one daughter, Daisy of Watertown, Mass two sons Harry at home and Arthur of Portland, Me, three brothers, George and Andrew in Maine, Jarvis in Cal, and three sisters Eliza, Mrs M Upham, and Mrs A H Libby in Mass. The interment was at McKenzie Corner. All of his family were present, also his youngest brother and sister Mrs Libby of Lawrence and Andrew of Bridge-water.

At South Knowlesville Carleton Co, on the 28th of March last James G Frost of that place died very suddenly, of heart disease.

Mr Frost was amongst the first settlers in that section who came from Argyle and other parts of Yarmouth County, N.S., when Knowlesville, was an unfilled forest and made themselves comfortable homes and was engaged in the occupation of husbandry all his life time.

Mr Frost made a profession of religion under the labours of Rev Chas Orser and united with the Primitive Baptist Church at South Knowlesville, about twenty five years ago. Later when the Knowlesville Primitive Baptist Church was united with that of East Windsor Mr Frost became one of its charter members, and on the death of the late F W Simms was elected a deacon in his place, which office he very worthily filled until his death.

Mr Frost leaves a widow who was Miss Zephora Mangum a daughter of the late William Mangum of Carlisle, and too a native of Yarmouth Co, N.S., and three sons and two daughters, Mrs Sewell of Rockland and Lois who still remains at home. Of the sons Sanford the eldest resides in New Hampshire and is engaged in a lucrative business in a brass foundry; the two younger sons reside with their father. The deceased was honest and upright in all his business undertakings, an exemplary christian, and a man at the age of 62 years which the country could ill afford to spare, but God's plans are beyond man's comprehension.

The funeral services were conducted by Rev G A Giberson of Bath in the Knowlesville United Baptist Church in the presence of a large congregation on the 29th ult at 2 P.M.—Com.
