A HANDSOME CHURCH.

St John the Evangelist Church of Johnville, under the pastoral charge of Rev R J Coughlan, has undergone a wonderful change in appearance exteriorly and interiorly. The main building has been lengthened by 30 feet and a beautiful tower has also been added. The work was commenced last May, and a continuous hurry and bustle were the order since the first nail was driven until the last touch of the painter's brush sounded the word *finis*. Very much praise is due so young a priest, as the present pastor is, for conducting to the complete satisfaction of all concerned so great and expensive a work.

The work was done by James Faulkner of Windsor, Carleton Co., and the people of Johnville will long remember him for the deep interest he took in the work entrusted to him. He is a shrewd manager as can readily be seen in looking around the premises. There are not many odd

ends nor waste lumber of any kind left.

The interior is laid off as follows: There are seven main arches in the body of the church of gothic style. Directly over the sanctuary rail is a perfect circle; in the top wall of this circle is a large heavy framed square panel in which there will be a steel picture of the "Crucifixion" inserted. The altar has been enlarged. Two heavy turned pedestals, for statue rests, one on each side, and with other finishings makes the altar and its surroundings objects of admiration for the eye to rest upon. There are seven gothic arches in each side wing facing the body of the church, and six elliptical arches in each of the side wings. The gallery has a large square front looking towards the altar with spool and bracket work finish and having two gothic arches one on each side of this elegantly designed front with panel work railing sheathed throughout with hard pine and with trimmings to suit. The ceilings are divided in nine sections forming quarter squares, each division finished with heavy quarter blocks, turned work, to set in corners with panel borders. The centre of each ceiling has a heavy and elegant drop centre from which hangs chandelier lamps. The painting was done by Mr Carl Schaefer of St John.

The work is a hardwood finish with trimmings of oak. The pillars are oak grained, and the altar rails and steps are also oak grained. The altar is white and gold leaf tipped. In fact every part of the church seems to be a picture in itself. So neat and rare is the design that a great many competent to judge such work have complimented Johnville upon having the most handsome church in its interior in Carleton County and for a wooden building there are few to surpass it in New Brunswick.
