The Committees on Church Union.

(Eastern Chronicle.)

The joint committee of the Presbyterian, Methodist and Congregational Churches on Union was in session last week in Toronto and long despatches came from it of the work it was engaged in. The members of the committee appointed by the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church are there without a mandate from even one of the Presbyterian congregations in the Dominion. That seems passing strange. In a movement of such importance a Presbyterian may reasonably suppose that the primary action would be to get the sanction of the congregations. As it is the General Assembly have been engaged for several years trying to effect a swap of the Presbyterian Church in Canada with several other churches. The Head of the Church once declared that the Sabbath was made for man, not man for the Sabbath. In this instance of the action of the General Assembly its members have it in their minds that the congregations are made for them, not they for the congregations. Such action seems wholly unconstitutional.

Another curious phase is the readiness of the members of the General Assembly to throw away, as if worth nothing, the principles on which the Presbyterian Church is founded. So called Calvinism and the Confession of Faith are to them only apparent myths—the sooner discarded the better. Even the name of the grand old church is nothing to them and its history as if an old wife's story.

In this connection it would be interesting to learn which of the old time teachings of Presbyterianism, the members of the General Assembly, do still believe in. At least, to an onlooker nothing in the past seems sacred to this band of daring iconoclasts.

And where do they expect to land?

Have they counted the cost? Do they really expect to erase the name of Presbyterian from the religious map of Canada? That seems to be what they are working for, but can they do it? Will the stern and rugged Presbyterians of Canada allow them to do it? Perish the thought! To us they seem to be acting the part of apostates to the grand old church—an organization that has done more for the liberty of mankind than any other existing in the world.

Suppose, too, that the General Assembly make a bargain with the other churches, with which they are negotiating, and when they come down to the Congregation that the latter will split up on the question? What then? Will the members of the General Assembly be delighted to see a number of weakened Presbyterian congregations while they are at the head of a lot of Union Churches equally weak? Just as sure as they live, if they succeed in carrying their illstarred scheme, that is the condition in which they will find the congregation. As an example, do they suppose that they can carry all the Presbyterian congregations of Pictou County into their contemplated church? As well may they expect to level its mountains to the plane of Northumberland Strait.

Oh, but they want a great big national church! As for the national benefit of such churches, history is against them. Too often they have proved a national curse instead of a national blessing. We could refer the members of the General Assembly to many instances of this. The secession of the Methodist from the Church of England did more for the religious life of England than was done by the parent church in the three preceding centuries. If the Presbyterian church in Scotland has done for that country what its admirers claim, one of the reasons was because it broke up a national church. The present political crisis over education in England is owing to its national church. The political struggle in France is an effort to break up a national church; and we can imagine no greater political calamity for Canada than the union of the Protestant churches into one religious body; such a consummation would be the beginning of a religious war between the two churches of the Dominion.

Of all men, Presbyterians, whose motto is political and religious equality and liberty, should set themselves against this movement that has for its object the bartering of their church and the right of congregations to govern.

Will they succeed in making a bargain with the other interested churches? Probably they will. Will it succeed with the people? We do not believe it will, as we have already stated. It is not a people's movement. The people concerned are satisfied as they are. It is a ministers' movement and hence does not deserve to succeed; indeed, it would never have been started if the ministers engaged in it had not drifted from the faith delivered to them by their fathers. They are to be pitied; but that is no reason why their action should not be condemned.

Aud, too, look at the coquetting with other churches besides the Methodist and Congregational churches some of whose principles and creeds are as wide apart from Presbyterianism as is the North Pole from the South Pole. But, notwithstanding, dominant members of the General Assembly are seemingly ready to go in for bishoprics with one body and head foremost into the water with another. Indeed, it is reasonable to believe that if there was an Archbishopship or two to be given out and a Cardinal's Hat into negotiations with the Pope of Rome for a union with the Catholic Church. They are the limit.
