THE TEACHERS.

The annual meeting of the Carleton County Teachers' Institute opened in the opera house last Thursday morning at 10 o'clock. There was a large gathering of teachers from all over the County. H F Perkins Ph B, president, was in the chair and R E Estabrooks, secretary was in his chair.

The enrollment fee was fixed at 25cts. The president appointed the following committees:

Nominating, George Belyea, Upper Woodstock; Audit, Fred C Squires, Florenceville; Miss Hartley, Bristol; Miss Mulherrin, Woodstock; Resolutions, Inspector Meagher, Woodstock; James O Steeves, Centreville; Miss Belyea, Bath.

Addresses were made by the president, W B Belyea, Mr Richards, principal of the Carleton County Grammar School and Mr Squires principal of the Florenceville consolidated school.

W B Shaw read a paper on drawing and illustrated his method by drawing on the blackboard. The discussion was opened by Miss Marion Tompkins.

At the afternoon session Mr Richards read a paper on literature and Dr J R Inch, Chief Superintendent of Education made a very interesting address. Afterwards the teachers made a visit to the Sloyd school where Miss Wetmore entertained them.

At the Friday morning session Mr Squires read a paper on Geometry, Dr Jones, Chancellor of the University of New Brunswick, gave an address and Mr I N Draper read a paper on spelling.

In the afternoon James O Steeves read a paper on Composition and George Belyea one on Geography.

The officers elected for the ensuing year are: President, C D Richards; B A, Vice President, F C Squires B A, Secretary, R E Estabrooks.

At the concluding session votes of thanks were tendered Dr J R Inch ann chancellor Harrison for attendance, and to the Militia Department for free use of the Armoury. Next year the Institute will meet at Florenceville sometime in October. (Com)

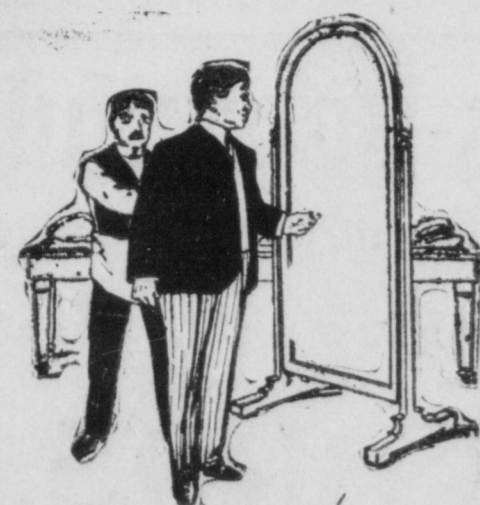
