THE SHEEP QUESTION.

There has been a marked decline
during recent years in the sheep
raising industry, not only through-
out Canada, but in the United States
and many European countries as well.
The census returns of 1901 showed
that there were at that time 285,000
sheep in the province against 308,000
in 1871. Showing a decline of 113,000
in thirty years.

There may be a number of econ-
omic reasons that have led the farm-
ers and sheep raisers of other coun-
tries not to devote so much attention
to this industry, but here in New
Brunswick we believe that the main
cause for the decline is—dogs.

We could cite case after case of
farmers here in Carleton who have
abandoned sheep raising entirely on
account of the ravages committed
in the flocks by the mongrel curs
that are allowed to exist, breed and
flourish in this county.

This summer a flock near here
were almost entirely destroyed by
the dogs of "neighbors."

Today it seems to be a question of
the sheep versus the dog and there
should not be a moment's hesitation
as to which of the two should win
the case.

The sheep raisers should have all
the protection that a law could give.
Every dog in this county should be
taxed, and, as in Ontario the re-
venue received, should be placed in
a fund to compensate the sheep
owner for any losses that may accrue

Big Stakes for Pugilists.

Nevada fight promoters do not evi-
dently think much of money. Every
day somebody bobs up with a \$25,000
offer for such and such a fight to be
held at some obscure mining camp.
The man who pulled off the Gans-
Nelson fight at Goldfield set the
pace. Tonopah is in line to gain
fame by securing the Gans-Herman
mill, to be decided there on New
Year's Day, while Rayolite is the
latest aspirant for free advertising,
a promoter there saving leaped to
the front with a \$25,000 offer to Burns
and O'Brien to fight to a finish on
April 1. Burns has wired his accept-
ance, and has also posted a forfeit,
while O'Brien has been quoted as
saying that he will sign articles if a
\$25,000 certified cheque is posted with
a responsible stakeholder. But the
Pacific A. C., of Los Angeles, is mak-
ing a strenuous attempt to land this
interesting match. This club will
hang up a \$25,000 purse and a gold
championship belt valued at \$5,500.
If the fighters prefer a percentage of
the gate to a purse, they can cut up
60 per cent. Burns has posted a
\$2,500 forfeit to clinch this match.
The Los Angeles offer will remain
open to O'Brien for three months,
and if he does not accept it at the
end of that time the belt will be
awarded to Burns by default.

In their attitude toward the Bible
Christians may be divided into two
classes. The old time orthodox be-
lievers accept the Book as literally
true, and the miracles it describes,
are believed because the Bible is
their authority. Another school, ex-
posed to the influence of higher
criticism, holds to the spiritual truth
of the Holy Book. The miracles,
these students say, did not actually
occur, but are to be regarded as
figures of speech, teaching a spiri-
tual truth by means of striking alle-
gory. To these classes must now be
added a third, which attempts to ex-
plain the miracles by natural means.
As a leader of these school of
thought, Prof. George Frederick
Wright, D.D., L.L.D., of Oberlin
Theological Seminary, is becoming
well known.

In a recent lecture Prof Wright
took up several of the miracles, and
showed how they might be explain-
ed in the light of recent advance-
ments in scientific knowledge. His
conclusions have excited consider-
able comment in the religious press.
Some of the miracles that have
proved the greatest stumbling blocks
to the literalists, like the story of
Jonah, the raisings of the dead,
Joshua and the sun, the feeding of
the multitude and Christ's walking
on the sea, he does not discuss, and
these omissions tend to destroy the
value of his other explanations from
a scientific point of view. He does,
however, take up such Biblical
stories as the passage of the Red
Sea by the children of Israel, the
destruction of Sennacherib's army,
the Flood, and the seven years'
famine. His first topic is the mad-

ness of Nebuchadnezzar, which, he
says, is frequently received with
incredulity, although this statement
may be as astonishing to students of
the Bible as Mr Wright's vindica-
tion of it. His explanation of the
story is that the King was a victim
of that form of insanity now well
known as melancholia. Under the
intoxicating nature of his great suc-
cesses as a warrior the king became
a megalomaniac, even exalting him-
self against God. A plunge from
these impious heights to the debas-
ing condition of a wild beast was
just what a modern doctor would ex-
pect, according to Prof Wright.
Therefore, he says, the story in
Daniel is no more remarkable than
one might find in a medical journal
of to-day.
