The Judicature Act.

By the terms of the bill which has been before the assembly for the past week, it is proposed to materially alter the Supreme Court of this province. When the new act is brought into force three judges will be assigned to circuit duty and a like number will sit as a Court of Appeal at Fredericton. It is generally believed that the present Chief Justice will be superannuated with full retiring allowance.

Bad Fire.

Rev F S Todd's fine home on St John Street was totally destroyed by fire early Monday morning. Mr Todd with his wife and mother was absent at the time. The fire is supposed to have originated in the cellar. The firemen were quickly on the scene, but the water service was so poor that nothing could be done except prevent the blaze from destroying the other houses in the vicinity. All the furniture, clothing, etc., in the house was destroyed. When the alarm was sent in the house was already like a seething furnace. There was small insurance. The net loss is put at \$5000.

THE MARKET.

Butter is very scarce. The best brings from 22 to 24 cts. Eggs are beginning to come in but are still higher than need be. Potatoes are hovering around \$1 per bbl. Oats are firm. Chickens are in brisk demand at 17 cents per lb. Poultry brings from 9 to 10. Turkey is absent. Carrots, and Squash are scarce, and prices high. Turnips are cheap. Beef by the quarter ranges from five to seven. Prime Western beef by the roast is retailed at 14 cts. Fish are cheap and plentiful.
