Political Notes.

Sir Hibbert Tupper has conditionally accepted the nomination for Pictou, N. S. This is worthy of note, for the young Knight has been out of politics since 1900. Realizing that his party may be beaten in the next campaign, and that defeat will sound the death-knell of the Borden leadership, Sir Hibbert evidently wishes to be in on the ground floor when the new leader is chosen. It may be that he has hopes of not only redeeming Pictou, but also of helping to win several other seats in his native province, in which event his performance would stand out in marked contrast with Mr Borden's annihilation and subsequent hegira of 1904. But there is much to overcome. Ned Macdonald the Liberal M P for Pictou is firmly entrenched. Although as a young man he succumbed to Sir Hibbert in 1896 and 1900, there are plenty who insist that he will take the measure of his doughty opponent when they next meet. Hon W S Fielding apparently holds Nova Scotia in the hollow of his hand. Mr Tupper incursion will add a dash of spice to what otherwise must prove a listless affair.

Certain organs of the Opposition persuasion are seeking to lead their readers to the inference that the government party will have difficulty in securing a presentable ticket in the city of St John. Just why this course has been adopted is hard to say. It may be that after calmly meditating upon the ticket placed in the running by their own friends, these Conservation journalists have discerned a marked similarity between the pot and the kettle. If their opponents will only be patient, the government forces may be depended upon to bring out a winning combination. Hon Mr McKeown four years ago led the poll in the City. Although he now sits for the County the arrangement may be but temporary. Mr Lantallum and Mr Purdy are by no means weaklings. The Opposition having nominated three of their former candidates, what is to prevent the friends of the government from a similar course? The old ticket was strong enough to win in 1903. It certainly should do quite as well in the future.

In the event of Opposition victory in the provincial elections, the country will surely become prosperous and well-governed in an unprecedented degree, for Mr Plinder will be Commissioner of Public Works, while Mr Smith by all means is entitled to the portfolio of Surveyor General.

Mr Hazen is the farmer's friend, so his organs claim, but he has no farmers on his tickets in Carleton, Sunbury, Albert or Queens, and only one in York and we doubt if there be any among the standard bearers for Kent and Gloucester. Except St John, where no farmer can be expected, these are the only counties having named their men. It looks as if Mr Hazen wants the farmers' votes, not their services in the House.

In the next federal campaign it is the wish of the machine that the Conservative leadership in the various provinces be assigned to Sir Hibbert Tupper for Nova Scotia, Mr Hazen in New Brunswick, Sir Alexander Lacoste for Quebec, Premier Whitney in Ontario, Hon Robt Rogers for Manitoba, Mr Haultain in Saskatchewan, Senator Longhead for Alberta, and Premier McBride in British Columbia. After the slaughter the leadership will doubtless be thankfully laid aside by Mr Borden, and the survivors in the above list will have to fight it out with Mr Foster, Mr Ames and a few other im possibilities.

An influential portion of the Conservative party, rapidly increasing in numbers, hold firmly to the view that under the present or any English-speaking leader, victory is well nigh impossible. They reason it out in this manner.—Sir Wilfrid is supreme in Quebec. Forty of a lead he is sure to have there. Mr Pugsley and Mr Fielding are good for from ten to fifteen majority out of the maritime contingent. The west will not reduce and may augment this handicap, and Ontario can by no means overcome a hostile majority of close to three score. Only by something like an even division in Quebec may the Laurier government be successfully assailed. It will take a French leader to break into the premier's stronghold. But where's the man? Echo answers "Where."

Local Politics.

In so far as the Liberal party in Carleton County is concerned, a most hopeful feeling is in evidence. At the last local election with the government forces rent in factions, they managed to elect one of their candidates, and a change of less than fifty votes would have given victory to all three. For the coming fight the prospect is ever so much brighter. With a member of the government heading the ticket, and two well-known gentlemen as colleagues, there is good reason for believing that all three will be handsomely returned. On the other hand the Opposition ticket is by no means so formidable as was the case before. Mr Smith won his election by reason of it being his first fight, and because he was in a sense a sectional candidate, there being no person from up river on the opposing ticket. Things not necessary to mention have happened since then. Mr Smith is scarcely so strong as was the case on his first appearance, and he has a government candidate right beside him, one who will prove a veritable stumbling block to the further political progress of the East Florenceville M P P. Mr Flemming has scarcely in the past four years tightened his hold. True he has done nothing very much to diminish his personal following, yet the people are wearying of his style of campaigning. The story is getting old, and Mr Flemming while doubtless a man of good intentions, is looked upon as the representative of a lost cause. Concerning the third member of the ticket, while his rugged tenacity of purpose, by some considered obstinacy, may occasionally serve him in good stead, few of his admirers expect him to do more than Mr Hartley accomplished. That he will fare so well is not conceded in government circles.

Of course the opposition organ is merrily whistling to keep up the courage of the party, but it has overdone the job. With the Highway Act repealed or substantially altered, and the Central Railway sold, the Opposition will be practically destitute of a policy. Their platform is merely a negative one, there is nothing in it of a constructive nature. The electors of Carleton three years ago wiped Mr Hale off the political map. The good work then begun will be carried to its logical conclusion when the provincial contest is held. If Mr Hazen is counting on having any supporters from Carleton he is reckoning without his host.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS.

Any even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, excepting 8 and 28, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres more or less.

Application for entry must be made in person by the applicant at a Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency for the district in which the land is situated. Entry by proxy may, however, be made at an Agency on certain conditions by the father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of an intending homesteader.

The homesteader is required to perform the homestead duties under one of the following plans:

(1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.

(2) A homesteader may, if he so desires, perform the required residence duties by living on farming land owned solely by him, not less than eighty (80) acres in extent in the vicinity of his homestead. Joint ownership in land will not meet this requirement.

(3) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of a homesteader has permanent residence on farming land owned solely by him, not less than eighty (80) acres in extent, in the vicinity of the homestead, or upon a homestead entered for by him in the vicinity, such homesteader may perform his own residence duties by living with the father (or mother).

(4) The term "vicinity" in the two preceding paragraphs is defined as meaning not more than nine miles in a direct line, exclusive of the width of road allowance crossed in the measurement.

(5) A homesteader intending to perform his residence duties in accordance with the above while living with parents or on farming land owned by himself must notify the Agent for the district of such intention.

Six months' notice in writing must be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa, of intention to apply for patent.
