Why There is no Third Term.

The persistence of talk about Mr Roosevelt being again a candidate for the Presidency of the United States, has evoked a certain amount of Canadian comment touching the folly of the convention which stands in the way of service for longer than two terms. We have continuous service here; they have continuous service in England; it works well; why should it not work well in the States? The argument looks plausible enough, but it fails to make allowance for the fundamental difference between the American system and ours. In the Canadian system which is the British system, executive power is absolutely contingent upon the ability of the executive to command the approval of the legislative authority. If Sir Wilfrid Laurier could not have his measures approved by the House of Commons he would cease to be Prime Minister. In the States, on the other hand, the executive is wholly apart from the legislative branches. The President has no seat in either house, and neither has any member of his cabinet, whom he is free to appoint as he would so many office boys, regardless of popular approval. There is no bye-election necessary to confirm his choice, and in fact the bulk of the appointees have never been elected to any legislature. It follows that, in the Canadian case, there is direct, constant, and, so to say, reciprocal pressure as between the executive and the popular body, whereas the relation between the American executive and the legislative branches is, in essence, accidental. The more intimate it becomes in fact, the more there is room for suspicion that the good-will of the legislature have been won by the judicious partition of executive favors. It is not the English system that appeals to Americans when they look about for the counterpart of their own, but the German, where the executive, also separate from the legislature, is able to dominate the situation, using now the support of this party, now the support of that, granting favor for favor received but never allowing the people the slightest choice about who shall comprise the executive and so rule the country. The innate fear of the average American, which may be more of a tradition than a reasoned principle, is that if a strong man were given long enough to do it he would be very apt to so solidify his influence by the use of the power at his disposal as to make himself master in something like the German way. How long a time, they do not know, but they say the line must be drawn somewhere, and they draw it at two consecutive terms of office. Mr Roosevelt is too good an American not to know that the rule will not be broken for him, however important he may look to be just now.
