CENTERVILLE FAIR

On the Whole there was a Good Attendance.—The Judges and the Prize Winners.

The committee in charge of the exhibition held on Tuesday and Wednesday of last week by the Wicklow, Wilmot and Kent Agricultural Society and Farmers' Institute No 44, notwithstanding many drawbacks, made the affair a success. President W J Owens, Secretary Julien E Long and Treasurer H T Scholey, assisted by the gentlemen of the society, were present on both days and proved to be capable and courteous officers.

The attendance on Tuesday was not large, but on Wednesday a bumper crowd was present from all parts of the county. Several rigs went up from Woodstock, carrying Mr and Mrs H E Burtt, C J York, Harry McElroy, etc.

There was no speechmaking but B F Smith, M P P, was present; J K Fleming, M P P, and Solicitor General Jones were absent from the county.

There were eleven classes as follows: Class 1, Horses; Class 2, Cattle; Class 3, Sheep; Class 4, Swine; Class 5, Poultry; Class 6, Roots and Vegetables; Class 7, Grain and Field Seeds; Class 8, Dairy Products; Class 9, Wool and Cotton Manufactures; Class 10, Fruits; Class 11, Manufactured Articles.

There was a good number of draft horses, but many entries were refused on Wednesday on account of failure to be entered on the first day. Roots and vegetables were very good. Turnips, extra good. Apples very good, particularly the Fameuse brand. There was not a very large display of cheese, but the butter was good. There was quite an attraction in the shape of a 100 lb pumpkin.

In the amusement line, Mr Parks had charge of the dolls and Mr Smith of the canes and knives.

George Sharp, Ernest Plummer and Archie Scott were judges on cattle, and Dr Standish of Ontario and John Mallory of Jacksonville on horses.

The Society has a building with a cook room attached, and tables well supplied with the best market affords; they had lots of cooks and cheerful waiters. The room will seat 60 at once. It is 18x34 feet; the cattle shed is 10 feet by 70, and will hold 30 head of cattle. The proceeds of exhibition goes toward repairing the exhibition building. The parishes that were united in the exhibition deserve credit for the progress they have made in different ways, and which made the annual exhibition a success.

These exhibitions are evidence of the prosperity of the county. It is pleasant to view the product of our rich soil in New Brunswick, equal to the Northwest.

There were many visitors from Woodstock, Jacksonville, Bridgewater, Blaine, Mars Hill, Hartland and Glassville, among them being Rev B Beatty of Bridgewater, Me, Rev J B Daggett of East Florenceville. Rev Mr Turner of Jacksonville, Rev Mr Ayer of Centerville, Rev Joseph Cahill of Hodgdon, Me, and Rev B F Freeman of Centerville.

Those that visited the show from a distance had good driving horses single and matched pairs, and first class carriages.

It is thought that next year the dining room will have to be enlarged to accommodate 100 at once.

The farmers north of Woodstock are hustlers and know how to run an exhibition.

Among the driving horses we noticed Dr Glen, owned by E I West, and driven by his son; he is a beautiful carriage horse and retains his usual speed. Horsemen say he has not yet reached his limit and could be made the leading star to his famous sire Red Glen.

The exhibition was a success in every sense of the word considering the wet weather. Horses showed up well. The stock was up to the average. The grain good considering the season. Vegetables good. Cabbage extra.

There were about 1200 people present. If the harvest had been gathered, more than double the number would have been present. Since those parishes have taken hold of the exhibition two years ago, they have succeeded by leaps and bounds, and in a few years the Centerville exhibition will stand at the head of the list according to privileges and population.

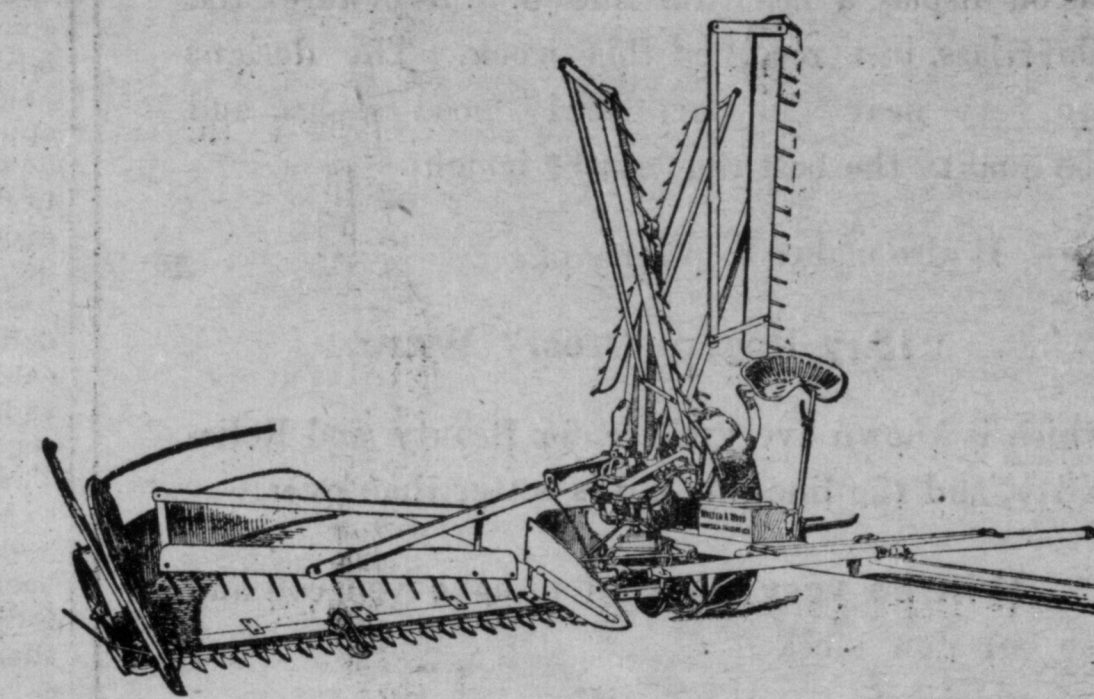
