It will be noticed that the lawyers got the lion's share of the money out of the Insurance Commission. Mr Shepley got \$25,000, while Judge McTavish received less than \$5,000. Mr Tilley got over \$12,000. The two business men—Mr Kemp and Mr Langmuir—ranked with Judge McTavish. Yet it would not be contended for a moment that we should have tried to get along with a cheaper lawyer than Mr Shepley. His work on the Commission was worth his fee several times over; or it will be if the Government have the courage to take advantage of the light he threw on the situation. Lawyers get their money in open competition. It is because they are worth what they charge to their clients that they are able to get it. But some times the mere laymen wonders if the law could not be so simplified that the services of an expert lawyer would not be worth so much more than those of a less well equipped barrister. If simplification is to be accomplished, however, it must in all probability be forced and carried through by laymen. Goldwin Smith once said in his succinct way—"A lawyer simplify the law! As well expect a tiger to cut down the jungle."—Montreal Star, Cons.
