Our contemporary editorially gives prominence to a rumor to the effect that Mr Andrew D McCain will not be a candidate in the local election. We hope all reports to this effect are not well founded for nothing could give the government forces greater pleasure than the opportunity to settle some scores with Mr B F Smith at the polls. Perhaps it is too much to ask, but it's no harm to suggest that a frank statement concerning Mr Smith's intended course would be interesting, if strictly speaking not important. The next issue of the Blunderbuss should convey the information.

Choosing a Warden.

Section 44 of the Municipalities Act is as follows:—

The Council elect and sworn shall at the first meeting after their return, choose from among themselves a Warden who shall hold office until the first meeting of the council after the next general election of councillors. Should a vacancy occur in the office of warden by death, resignation, or otherwise, the council at its first meeting thereafter shall elect a warden, but during his temporary absence they may choose a chairman from the members present.

It is plain from the above section that the warden's tenure of office is ordinarily the life of the Council, — two years. He may resign at any time if he so elect, but unless he voluntarily submits his resignation or dies, there is no warrant for appointing a new warden midway in the life of the Council. In Carleton County the past half dozen years through some misunderstanding it has been the custom to appoint a warden each year. It should be thoroughly understood that whoever is chosen at the first meeting of the new council next month will be warden for two years unless he resign or die within that period. From the strictly legal standpoint it would seem as if Mr A G Bailey is still Warden of Carleton County, although in his absence last January the Council chose a successor, who, strictly speaking, was chairman only for the time being. There might be a chance for legal quibbling some time in future over a similar circumstance, so it will be just as well to start right in the new council.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS.

Any even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, excepting 8 and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres more or less.

Application for entry must be made in person by the applicant at a Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency for the district in which the land is situated. Entry by proxy may, however, be made at an Agency on certain conditions by the father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of an intending homesteader. The homesteader is required to perform the homestead duties under one of the following plans:

(1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.

(2) A homesteader may, if he so desires, perform the required residence duties by living on farming land owned solely by him, not less than eighty (80) acres in extent in the vicinity of his homestead. Joint ownership in land will not meet this requirement.

(3) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of a homesteader has permanent residence on farming land owned solely by him, not less than eighty (80) acres in extent, in the vicinity of the homestead, or upon a homestead entered for by him in the vicinity, such homesteader may perform his own residence duties by living with the father (or mother).

(4) The term "vicinity" in the two preceding paragraphs is defined as meaning not more than nine miles in a direct line, exclusive of the width of road allowance crossed in the measurement.

(5) A homesteader intending to perform his residence duties in accordance with the above while living with parents or on farming land owned by himself must notify the Agent for the district of such intention.

Six months' notice in writing must be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa, of intention to apply for patent.


