Poultry Exhibition.

In about every part of Canada the poultry business has assumed large proportions, but strange to say here in fertile Carleton where feed abounds and opportunities are numberless, it has thus far been only a neglected side line, left chiefly to the women and children. Evidently a new day has come for this important industry.

There was recently organized at Hartland what is known as the Carleton and Victoria Poultry, Pigeon and Pet Stock Association. The Association has got right down to business and will hold at Hartland the first Poultry Exhibition ever held in these parts, on Jan 23 and 24. Preparations are being made on an extensive scale; it is expected there will be over 300 birds on exhibition. A number of cups have been donated, one by Dr McIntosh for the highest scoring bird, one by O W Hurst for the best pen of any favorite breed, one by Dr Hagerman for the highest scoring pen of any American breed, one by Rev J B Daggett for the best pen of Rose Comb Rhode Island Reds. There are a number of smaller prizes as well.

The exhibition will be opened with a public meeting on Jan 23, at which a number of addresses will be given.

The farmers should give special attention to this exhibition. Any information desired will be gladly given by addressing Rev J B Daggett the President, at East Florenceville, or O W Hurst, the Secretary, at Hartland.

The County Court.

County Court opened in the court house at Upper Woodstock, Tuesday morning, Judge Carleton presiding.

There was but one criminal case, that of the King vs Havelock Sherwood, of the parish of Wilnot, charged with assault upon Ada Francis, who was under fourteen years of age. Miss Francis was but a mere child when she came from the Middlemore Home in Birmingham (Eng) and was adopted by Sherwood and his wife. The grand jury composed of the following—John Mallory, John Foren, George Burtt, Albert E Jones, Henry Phillips, James Hamilton, Augustus F Lockhart, William Kimball, John Hughes, James Good, Thomas Lindsay, N Foster Thorne, John Malaney, Chas R Watson, James McManus, Joseph Cheyne, Everett Colwell, Solomon Perley, William Kearney, Howard D Stevens, George McQuarrie, Amaliah Wright and George F Smith, chose Solomon Perley as foreman.

Ada Francis, her brother George Francis living with Rev Henry Hartt in Jacksonville, and Dr Bearsto were the only witnesses before the grand jury. The girl told her sad story, and the jury had no hesitation in presenting a true bill.

When called upon the defendant did not appear, and it is generally felt that he left the country several weeks ago. After being committed for trial by Magistrate Dibblee he was allowed out on bail to appear at this court on \$2,000 bonds, consequently his bail and the bail of his sureties were forfeited and the judge expressed the hope that the bond would be collected by the provincial government.

The first civil case was Wm Armstrong of Lakeville vs John Connors of Kilfoil, for breach of contract. Plaintiff last July bought 24 lambs and a steer from defendant. Later on, def't backed out, and there was refusal of delivery. Action was for recovery of \$50 paid on account, and damages for breach of contract. Jury composed of Winslow Dyer, Elmore Robinson, John Lipsett, David Parks and Amos Demerchant gave verdict in favor of plaintiff for \$70. Carvell K C for plaintiff; Connell K C for defendant.

A D Holyoke vs The Gleaner was settled out of court, defendant paying claim, which was bill for reporting the Smith case last July. Saunders vs Shannon was likewise withdrawn, and as we go to press Bohan vs Dibblee is before the court. His Honor severely scored defendant's counsel, Pickett, for failure to get here on time, thereby putting additional expense on the province. In the Smith case for stealing logs the Crown entered a nolle prosequi.

Hooligan Politics.

Certain of the more abandoned of the Opposition organs have given inordinate prominence to the vulgarities which Mr Clements, the Tory member for West Kent, introduced into the debate on the Address, in the cheap-jack attack on Hon Sydney Fisher. It is to be deplored that a person of Mr Clements' calibre could get himself elected to Parliament from any constituency in the Dominion. But Mr Fisher's reputation as a capable administrator and a high-minded public man, is too well established to be damaged in the smallest degree by the impudent mudslinging of small-sized partisans. The Toronto News, strongly anti-administration as it is, takes occasion at once to rebuke Mr Clements for his breach of good parliamentary manners, and to bear testimony to the excellent public work of Mr Fisher. "The Minister of Agriculture," it says, "is not at all likely to perish in the ginsaying of Clements. The Chesterfield from West Kent quoted on the floor of the House the opinion of an outsider, name unknown, that Mr Fisher was an ass and an idiot. Evidently Mr Clements shares that opinion; and looks on the Minister and his Department with scorn. He is wrong. No person is always right even he of the least experience. Mr Fisher is not an ass, or he would have replied to the member for West Kent in scurrilous personalities. Still less is he an idiot. In the main, he is a clear-sighted politician, who knows his duty as Minister of Agriculture, and does it well. It is doubtful if there is another Department better organized than that of Mr Fisher. Still the Minister has his faults, as the Dundonald case testified. He is an eager partizan, but he is honest and enjoys a certain prestige in the country which billingsgate from West Kent cannot destroy."

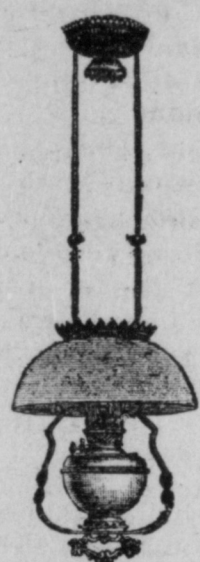
