THE TOWN FATHERS.

The Town Council met Monday night in special session, all members being present.

Mayor Munro reported upon his visit to St John last week, where he attended the gathering of the Canadian Municipalities Union. His Worship also said the refuse indiscriminately piled on the river bank near the mouth of the creek rendered that entrance practically useless.

The Clerk read the draft of a bill prepared for presentation to the Legislature, concerning the regulation within the Town of the sale of non-intoxicating beer, and the traffic in junk. On motion of Coun Fisher, seconded by Coun Burt, the bill was ordered sent to the Legislature.

The wood question came up. The Mayor suggested appointing a surveyor. Coun Burt said three or four should be appointed, so as to accommodate the vendors, who sometimes have trouble in finding the surveyor. Coun Hagerman wanted a wood market defined. He said the Citizens should be protected, as wood here is more costly than in almost any other town in the province. A committee consisting of Couns Hagerman, Burt and Sutton was appointed to look into the matter of establishing a wood market.

On motion of Coun Burt, seconded by Coun Noble, John A Lindsay was unanimously appointed Scott Act Inspector at a salary of \$300 per annum.

Coun Dunbar submitted a list of delinquents on water rates, which on his motion, seconded by Coun Hagerman, was ordered handed in for immediate collection. A list of sewer delinquents was similarly treated.

The Mayor said money was needed at the Bank, as the account is overdrawn about \$1000. This would necessitate some prompt work by the collectors. The assessment, too should be made out early.

The Mayor reported that the steam fire engine was taken to a fire in Grafton the other day, and through an accident, got put out of commission, as the tubes melted.

The mayor asked the Chief who authorized the apparatus to go out of the Town. The Chief said "you did." This the mayor said was not sufficient authority, and asked Supt Fewer as to a conversation between them. The Supt put the Mayor straight, and Coun Fisher as chairman of the committee said he was never spoken to at all in connection with the matter. He thought there must be carelessness somewhere.

Commissioner Fewer said he never wanted to go at all, as he knew one team could never get the engine to the fire. The Mayor said he wrote outside as to data concerning the repairs, and felt that the cost will be nearly \$2500 in order to put in a new boiler. The Mayor wanted the engine fixed. Coun Dunbar co-incided with this view, as the engine to him seemed a necessity. Coun Hagerman moved that a public meeting be called in the Town Hall this (Friday) evening at eight o'clock to give the ratepayers a chance to express an opinion on the advisability of repairing the engine.

Coun Dunbar, seconded by Coun Burt, nominated James Carr as Superintendent of Water Works, and Sewers, at a salary of \$500 per year. Coun Noble wanted to know how much of Carr's time would be expected. Coun Dunbar replied "all that is necessary." Coun Hagerman said a man should be secured who

will devote his whole time. The offers of G E True at \$650, John Tattersall at \$624, and J B Brewer \$600 were read, as well as application from John Lindsay without any stated salary. The motion passed unanimously.

Coun Noble, seconded by Coun Sutton, moved that the Town of Woodstock join the union of the Canadian Municipalities, and that the fee of \$10 be paid in connection therewith. After passing some laborers' bills the Council adjourned.

THE prettiest, and by reason of the social prominence of both bride and groom, the most notable wedding of the winter season so far took place at 9 o'clock in St Paul's Episcopal Church, when Miss May O Gilligan and Mr Sabine Leonard Carr were united in marriage in the presence of more than 100 guests. The decorations of the church were in charge of the young ladies of the Gamma Gamma Chi sorority and the elaborate scheme carried out formed a beautiful setting for the ceremony. The altar was banked with palms and greens, against which the masses of white chrysanthemums and white ribbed aises formed a beautiful contrast. Promptly at 9 o'clock, the Lohengrin wedding march played by Miss Zoe Stangroom, the bride on the arm of her uncle Mr Hugh Eldridge, entered the church and was met at the altar by the groom, who was attended by Mr Carey Hay as best man and Mr Henry Jukes and Mr Bruce Ferris, groomsmen. The bride looked especially radiant in her wedding gown of heavy white lace over white taffeta, of empire cut and entrain. She wore a veil and carried an immense shower bouquet of lilies of the valley. The matron of honor, Mrs Henry Jukes and the bridesmaids, Miss Maude Edens and Miss Grace Huntton, were also in white and carried bouquets of pink carnations. The wreath of pink flowers which they wore in their hair gave a pretty touch to the costumes. Little Miss Marion Ellis, looking like a fairy in her dainty white frock, was the flower girl and preceded the party strewing flowers in the path of the bride. Mr F D Kenyon, Mr J W Kendall, Mr James Prentice and Mr O L Roberts were the ushers. Rev A W Cheatham performed the ceremony. The bridal party left the church to the strains of Mendelssohn's wedding march and was immediately conveyed to the home of Mr and Mrs Hugh Eldridge, where a wedding breakfast was served. Mr and Mrs Carr left on the noon train for a wedding tour of British Columbia cities. The bride's going-away suit was a tailored model of dark green cloth. After January 15 Mr and Mrs Carr will be at home in the A J Craven residence, 1120 Garden Street.

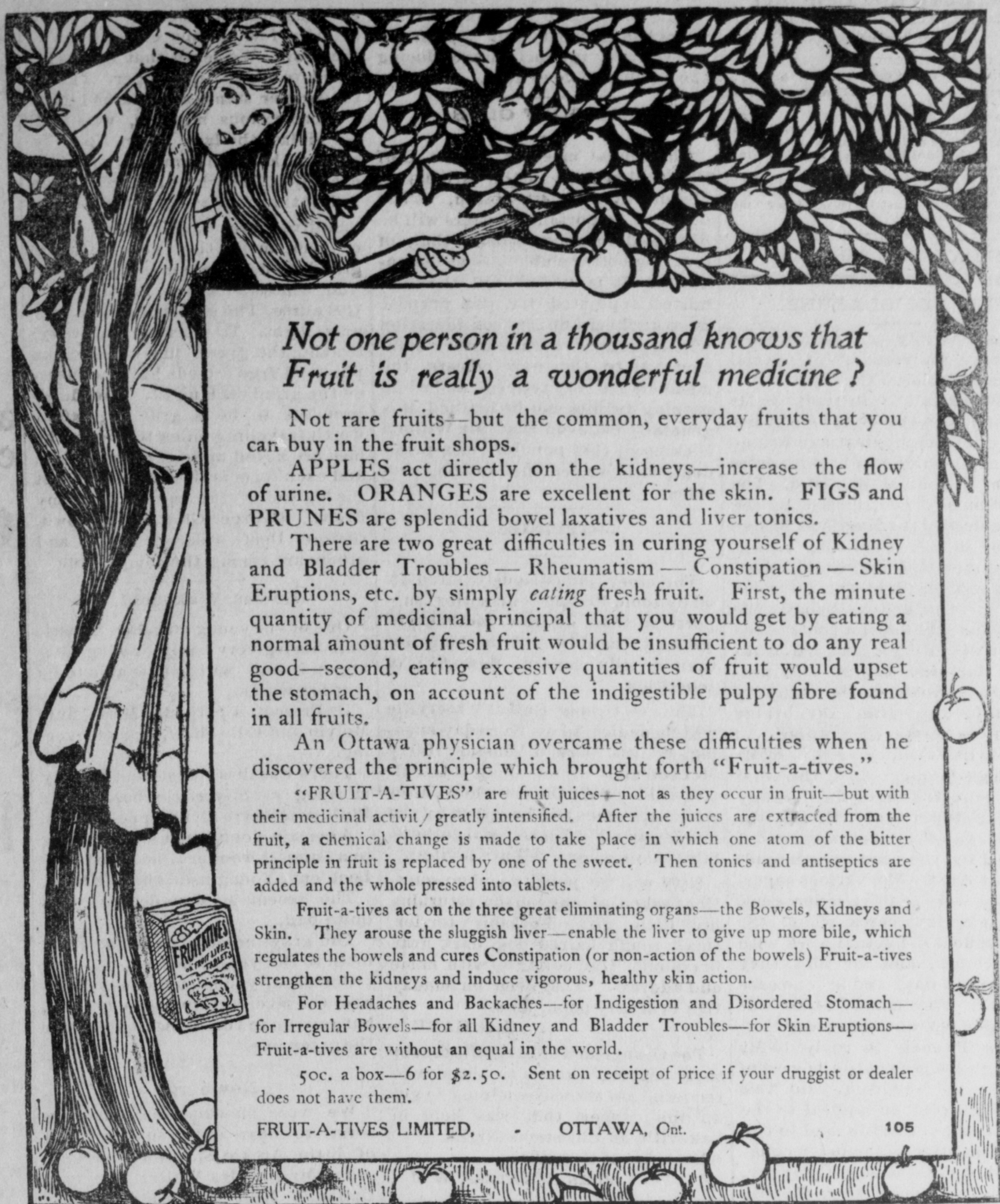

The New Officials.

The sequel to the decapitation of Joseph Fewer was enacted Monday night, when the council, on nomination of Coun Dunbar, unanimously appointed James Carr to the vacant position at a salary of \$500 per year, being \$20 in excess of that paid the man who was discharged apparently without reason, for if any valid excuse existed, it has not yet been brought to light. Mr Carr may become a first class superintendent,—we sincerely trust he will, as we know him to be a man of intelligence, yet the council must stand convicted of a gross injustice in wantonly dismissing the former official.

John A Lindsay, a gentleman who probably fears neither man nor devil, was appointed Scott Act Inspector to succeed Rev H Colpitts, at a salary of \$300. It is not so very long ago that Mr Lindsay while a member of the Council, voted to keep the salary at \$100. Still we presume there is nothing inconsistent in taking the position himself at the larger figure. The Mayor a few weeks ago made a remarkably hostile declaration against the liquor dealers, and if his new official takes anything like so decided a stand there is bound to be a flying before the end of the year. We shall not attempt to advise any official, much less the Scott Act Inspector, as to his duty, yet we may be permitted to express the wish, in which a majority of the citizens will join, that all things be done decently and in order, and that justice and moderation rather than fanaticism be the guiding element in the discharge of the difficult and remarkably thankless position.
