Interesting Letter from a Woodstock Man.

DEAR EDITOR,—

Your readers may possibly be interested in a few lines pertaining to things away from home and in a manner to the way a part of the outside world is wagging. The Great West never ceases to be interesting to Canadians of any section of our country and I will first say a few words on that subject. It is very properly called the "Last West" and with this in view our friends the Yankees who have experienced and profited in the nilling up process of the Western States are fully alive to similar advantages to be gained in our West, and he as readily buys a large tract of land as he would a farm and pays the price and says it is cheap at that, while our Eastern Canadian investor is somewhat timid and certainly more careful, not that he lacks faith in the future but that he has not been educated along the same line. It may be taken for granted that our farm lands in the West and also in the East will constantly grow in value and before many years the United States will need some of our grain, as well as other products and in the meantime our consuming population will be largely increased. Even now many manufacturers are unable to supply the ever growing demand for their products, and while the West is growing the East must profit largely. Here in Toronto conservative estimates place the increase of population for 1906 at 20 thousand, and Montreal claims much more, not to mention several important manufacturing centres in Ontario and Quebec where growth is healthy at least. In the West particularly Land is King and millions are being invested in farm lands, timber limits, and city property, and there is optimistic faith on every hand. Outside investors should be careful and not be misled by cheap prices especially of Winnipeg city lots, so called. Some of these "city lots" advertised are, to the writer's own knowledge, ten miles from the centre of the city. One needs faith and courage to buy property even four miles out at present prices and hope for a profit on his investment within a reasonable time. Winnipeg has a population of from 100,000 to 125,000, depending on who you are asking. The real estate dealer believes in the larger figures. Winnipeg will become a large city in time, there seems no reasonable doubt, but this subdividing of what is really farm lands and selling the lots as city property is bound to bring loss to the purchasers, most of whom live outside the city and know nothing of values. Whether buying farm lands or city property it is always safe to see the property. Many in the Lower Province have been and are now investing in the West and this may interest those who intend investing. To those who think of living in the West I would advise making a trip of inspection as there is much to be considered before deciding finally. The Manitoba Elections were very warm in Winnipeg particularly, much warmer than the weather. The writer attended two of the principal meetings and as was remarked by another New Brunswicker present, there are more than one of our own boys in N B who in speaking ability could "knock them all hollow." Roblin is undoubtedly clever and in his method of approach and reference reminds one of the late Hon A G Blair, otherwise no other comparison is prudent. Of course you have heard of Cobalt. Cobalt seems to be the centre of Cobalt investors, or rather speculators. Cobalt Lake is supposed to be the crater of an extinct volcano and to this Lake the richest veins of silver are said to converge. According to an official report to the Dominion Government the rich area is six square miles. Before the Nipissing bubble burst any old thing would do for a "rich prospect" and capitalized at a million or more, the universal thirst for wealth would do the rest. The mines so far in and around Cobalt are capitalized at over 300 million. I regret the loss to Woodstock people by the late fire, and this reminds me of the fearful loss of life in a Montreal School recently. I presume our Woodstock Schools continue the fire drill started in 1905.

New Brunswick potatoes are the favourite here and while there is probably a limit to the demand it seems a settled fact that a large portion of Ontario and Quebec is unsuited for raising potatoes of the best quality. The weather here during the winter has for the most of the time been dull and disagreeable.
