The Smith Case.

B Frank Smith M P P of East Florenceville appeared before Magistrate Dibblee in the Town Hall Monday afternoon on complaint of The St. John River Log Driving Company that the defendant had in the year 1906 and 1907 fraudulently received logs from the St. John river, without the consent of the owners. F B Carvell K C represented the complainant Company. Mr Smith was defended by J O Hartley.

Lewis H Bliss of St Mary's, secretary of the Company, was the first witness. He said in obedience to instructions received, from the President of the concern he had come to Woodstock on Saturday and laid information against Mr Smith.

Tise Dyer was the next witness. He said he had been working for Mr Smith rafting the gentleman's logs, and had also sold certain other logs to Smith which he found running in the stream. Dyer's testimony was of considerable length, and no mere synopsis will do the case justice. Wm Burnham followed, and in essential details, corroborated the previous witness. Wm Hopkins told of having been working for Smith pulling in logs out of the river, and during the operation had got into a dispute with Smith as to the ownership of certain of them. Witness said he told Smith some of the logs the latter wanted pulled in did not belong to him. Smith insisted that they were his. As a result of this dispute Hopkins swore he threw up his position that night. Deputy Sheriff Foster told of the arrest of Dyer and the circumstances which followed.

Mr Hartley put these witnesses through a gruelling cross-examination, and called Adolphus Lovely as his first witness, after which the examination was adjourned until Wednesday afternoon.

On the resumption of the inquiry Perry Crain was called by Mr Carvell and told of his lumbering operation on the Monquart. Mr Hartley in cross-examination, sought to make it appear that these Monquart logs were running in the main river at the time Dyer picked up the joint in question.

At the conclusion of Crain's testimony, Mr Hartley asked that his client be dismissed, and in doing so claimed that political motives were behind the prosecution. He said if Smith were not an M P P he would never have been brought to trial. Mr Carvell took exception to this remark, and informed the court that his learned friend was absolutely in error. He said the charge of political persecution was unfounded as the complainants wanted this case commenced last year, and that he had counselled moderation, well knowing the political cry would be

raised. This year the Company would not listen to effort on the part of anyone to keep the case out of court. The proceedings waxed very warm at this stage.

The Magistrate said he could not accede to Mr Hartley's request, whereupon B Frank Smith was called in his own defense, and made a general denial of all the charges. He said he never stole any logs, nor did he ever receive any that he did not honestly believe were his own. Cross-examined, he admitted he had been on the raft to which the joint in question was afterwards attached which was at that time some forty or fifty feet away, that the logs were counted, and that it was the intention to have the joint added to the main raft.

Major John R Tompkins and Heber Jamieson were the remaining witnesses. Major Tompkins denied having been on the joint, admitted scaling the raft, and identified a chip containing his initials and some measurements. Neither lawyer addressed the magistrate at this stage, and his honor, intimated that he would take sometime to look into the evidence before deciding as to whether the case shall be sent up for trial. Judgment will be given tomorrow (Saturday) afternoon.
