### Our Next Mayor.

Who will be our next Mayor? It's pretty early to pick the winner, but there are lots of possibilities. Everybody admits that our present worthy chief magistrate with visions, hazy though they may be, of a soft seat in the gilded halls of state before him, will abandon the smaller field.

True he has held office for two terms. Once he went in with a thumping majority, and was later accorded re-election by acclamation, so he can justly lay claim to a fair share of local honors.

Then again it takes an exceptional candidate to land three straight heats. It has been done, but to try to repeat the trick in the present era would be a hazardous undertaking. By all the rules of the game we are due to have a new chief magistrate. Who will he be? Will he be one of the present council, or like the present mayor, elevated from the ranks?

Let us first consider the material within the chamber. Coun Dunbar openly confesses to having his satirist in town matters. He is booked for voluntary retirement.

Sitting alongside him is the quiet member, Coun Fisher, who says little but thinks a whole lot. Could he be tempted to make a run for the chair? It's too early to make a bold statement, but we will throw out the hint that a requisition from the citizens might induce the chairman of the Fire Committee to seriously consider the situation.

What of Coun Burtt? Has he not earned the pleasure of a trip through the chair? Yes, and Coun Burtt if he wants the position would be a formidable competitor, but like Coun Dunbar, he is not disposed to stay in the whirl of town affairs. Some day he may return, and it will likely be at the head of the table.

This brings us across to Coun Hagerman. "The Ward" may think it is pretty nearly time for a South Side Chief Magistrate. If Coun Hagerman should get that idea in his head there will be a strong man in the race, and whoever beats him will qualify for the free-for-all.

A little bird conveys the word that genial Coun Sutton has friends who are seeking to push him into the race. Like Coun Hagerman he has had only a year at the Board, and may be very willing to stand aside for the present. When he does come, though, let all opponents keep off the track.

This brings us to Coun Noble, who has had a year of strenuous service, has made an excellent record, and can be mayor if he wants the job, but to his credit we believe he has decided to cease washing the town's linen in public, and will hereafter attend to that business solely in Emerald Street. Hat's off to Coun Noble! He is a clean, representative citizen, but is too wise to try to please everybody at once. This exhausts the timber from within, and now we shall deal with some of the material without.

Picking a mayor is like finding a needle in a haystack.

The local haystack is pretty big. There are perhaps a hundred in town from whom a mayor of first class ability could be selected. It will take a bright eye to pick the winner.

Every year or so there is talk of John McLauchlan, years ago a valued councillor. His services at the time of the installation of the Water Works were worth a great deal to the town. No doubt he might have considerable aversion to a contest, but the fact remains that he would fill the chair with great acceptance. Put John McLauchlan down as a possibility.

A little farther down street one comes to Ex-Warden Bailey. Some one has said he has an eye on the chair. Maybe so, perhaps not. If he has, so much the better for the town. Mr Bailey would be a formidable candidate. He is of course popular in his own party, and would scarcely be antagonized by certain powerful political opponents. Put A G Bailey down as a probability.

Many are anxious for George Balmiau to step upon the dias. Mr Balmiau is a man of splendid executive capacity, and would make good in the chair, but is minus the hankering for office. Stir him up, people.

How would His Worship Mayor Sheasgreen sound? Make up your minds gentlemen, and leave your answers at the People's Pharmacy. It seems good at this distance.
