#### C P R Changes.

The CPR seldom takes the public into its confidence in advance. This is a rule of all big corporations, and from their own standpoint it is a rather good one. It does not take one gifted with the instinct of a Sherlock Holmes, however, to scent the possibility,-yea even the imminent probability, of some rather important doings on the part of the big railway in this section. To begin, it is true that surveys are now being made between Woodstock and Hartland, having in view the location of one of those dead level routes that stared the GTP surveyors in the face. It is well-known that the present line between here and the lively up-river town is somewhat akin to the passage Napoleon took when he crossed the Alps, and the railway people are dead anxious to avoid the hills and curves, not to mention the other difficulties. The proposed route seems to be pretty close to the river, which when adopted, will result in the moving of Newburg Junction at least a couple of miles nearer town, if not doing away with it altogether, for there is a persistent rumor that the CPR after all has made up its mind to erect a fine new depot in Woodstock, on the site of the old station in Wellington Ward, equip it with dining room and office accommodation, and thereby get rid of two of the three stops now necessary from Lower Station to Newburg inclusive. Here's hoping the Company will come up handsomely. Despite all the fulminations of the Board of Trade and some of the local newspapers, the citizens of Woodstock are not all up in arms against Sir Thomas and his railway.
