Jacobson Goes Free.

Hyman Jacobson, the St John junk dealer sent up on the charge of buying stolen property, knowing it to be such, was tried here on Tuesday and Wednesday in the Armory before Judge Carleton and a jury. The alleged offense consisted of the purchase of some C P R brass journals from one Calial Aboud, a local Assyrian. The evidence was rather conflicting, so the jury took the reasonable view of giving the benefit of the doubt to Jacobson, who went on the stand in his own defense, and denied Aboud's story in toto. Marvin L Hayward ably represented the Crown, while J Chipman Hartley and Berton L Gerow, the latter a young St John barrister, defended the accused.
