SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST
HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS.

Any even numbered section of Dominion
Lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Al-
berta, excepting 8 and 26, not reserved, may
be homesteaded by any person who is the
sole head of a family, or any male over 18
years of age, to the extent of one-quarter
section of 160 acres, more or less.
Entry must be made personally at the local
and office for the district in which the land
is situated.
The homesteader is required to perform the
conditions connected therewith under one of
the following plans:
(1) At least six months' residence upon and
cultivation of the land in each year for three
years.
(2) If the father (or mother), if the father is
deceased of the homesteader resides upon a
farm in the vicinity of the land entered for,
the requirements as to residence may be
satisfied by such persons residing with the
father or mother.
(3) If the settler has his permanent residence
upon farming land owned by him in the
vicinity of his homestead, the requirements
as to residence may be satisfied by residence
upon the said land.
Six months' notice in writing should be
given to the Commissioner of Dominion
Lands at Ottawa of intention to apply for
patent.

The Potato Duty.

As an instance of the good results following the increase in the duty on potatoes coming into Canada, the SENTINEL can vouch for the following:—

A few days before the duty was raised, two Upper Province buyers were in this section endeavoring to purchase four or five carloads at one of the up-river shipping points. Negotiations were proceeding when the increased duty was announced. Up to that time the Ontario buyers refused to give more than \$1.10, stating they could do better in Michigan, just across the boundary from their home. When they were told that on Mr Carvell's initiative the duty was raised 15 cents, they at once increased their offer to \$1.25, and got the potatoes. Thus it will be seen how in this single instance many dollars went right into the pocket of the New Brunswick farmer. This is only one inst. nec. If we take the number of barrels shipped from Carleton County in a year we may readily compute the number of dollars Mr Carvell has been able to place in the pocket of the farmers of our noble county. A conservative estimate of the number shipped would be nearly 50,000 barrels. At 15 cents per barrel this means over Seven Thousand Dollars more each year for the Carleton County farmers, due to the wise enactment of the government upon the representation of Mr Carvell.
