The Minister of Justice and R. L. Borden.

HON. A. B. AYLESWORTH AT ESSEX: "At Peterboro Mr Borden said I was a discredit to Canada. On the floor of the House of Commons I told Mr Borden that I entertained very little value for any opinion he might form of me.

"It may be that I am a little prejudiced against Mr Borden because he is but a recent convert to the Conservative faith. In any event that gentleman is welcome to his opinions but they are not the opinions of the country.

"While there is talk of discredit I want to know if Mr Borden is not the man who stands discredited before the people of Canada.

"As Conservative leader he had not been able to find in his own native province of Nova Scotia where the people knew him, a single constituency that had any confidence in him.

"Is he the man to say that I am a discredit to Canada in my position I reciprocate the compliment."

Hazen for Ottawa.

It has leaked out that Mr Borden has induced the leader of the local opposition to agree to desert the uninviting provincial arena when the federal election will be held. Of course the general election for the Assembly will come off before the federal fight, and if he should again secure a seat the leadership in the local is to go to Mr Clarke of Charlotte, much to the vexation of a couple of small bore Carleton Co. politicians, who in spite of their lack of qualifications, and certain defeat staring them in the face, are indiscreet enough to consider themselves eligible. The plan is for Wilmot to step aside in Sunbury Queens, and Hazen to carry the constituency, if he can. Of course the leadership for the province, which for the want of any candidate of even ordinary attainments has gone begging since Mr Foster's forced hegira, is to fall to Mr Hazen. This is a pretty programme, and well shows the decadence of the once great conservative party in New Brunswick.

Transferred.

Hugh Bruce, despatcher at the Lower Station, has received notice of his transfer to St John. Mr Bruce expects to leave for that City next week. During the six or seven years spent in this town he has become popular in social circles, and will be much missed. He is an enthusiastic golfer as well, and gave promise of becoming a tower of strength to the local club.

Rev H E Dibblee, the popular and energetic rector, of Oromocto, has tendered his resignation and is arranging to leave shortly for California to take up his abode. The reverend gentleman has not been enjoying the best of health for over a year and for that reason finds it necessary to seek a more genial climate than New Brunswick affords. He will obtain a parish in California and make his home there in future. Rev Mr Dibblee has labored long and faithfully in Sunbury County, and his departure to another field will be sincerely regretted by his many friends, who are not by any means confined to any one denomination.

In brief, practically half the counties will be sure to send supporters of the government. With the doubtful exception of Sunbury there is not a safe Conservative seat in the province, while there are at least half a dozen counties with more than a third of the entire representation certain to send a solid support to the present regime. If the Opposition should win two thirds even of the doubtful counties, and this is a most generous estimate, they will still be a long way from victory. Make no mistake, the government will be sustained, and to cover opposition money at even betting is like taking silver from blind men.

So anxious were we to avoid anything like an unfair summary it will be seen that we have placed even York and Carleton in the doubtful column. In the first named county the Opposition ticket is morally certain to be snowed under, while in Carleton all hope of electing Smith and Munro has been abandoned, if indeed it ever existed, and the leader of the ticket, Mr Flemming, is piteously begging enough Liberal votes to secure his personal return. Of course our amiable and truthful contemporary will come out on Monday and pooh-pooh our estimate, but let any person who cares to do so pin this one in his hat for reference.

Salvation Army News.

Saturday night and all day Sunday our favorite Envoy Gerowe of Halifax conducted the Army meetings here in the absence of the local Officers, who were attending the general meeting in St John. Good audiences attended all the meetings which they all enjoyed. Sunday afternoon the Envoy lectured on his emigration work. Frank A Gerowe or Envoy Gerow as he is best known, has been in the Emigration Work for 9 years and for the last 3 years has been the Superintendent at Halifax. It would be hard to get another man to fill Envoy Gerow's place, he is fully given over to his work, the welfare of the children placed under his care is the thing that lies nearest his heart. The children all love him for he is to them as a father and he often speaks of his family of 850 children which he at present has oversight of. Envoy Gerowe is therefore capable of being able to tell about Emigration Work. During his lecture he told that he was the representative of the Middlemore Home, Birmingham, England, founded by John T Middlemore 1872. Since that time 3,800 children have been brought to Canada by that Institution. In passing he made mention of prejudice which some people had in this country against bringing Emigrants from England here. Some people think the children's parents are criminals etc. and that they are not fit to mix with the children of Canada. But such is not the case, the children are mostly orphans or some whom their parents are not able to support, and by bringing them here to Canada they are given opportunities which they have not got in the old land. He further stated that 99 per cent turned out to be good citizens, looked up to and respected by all who know them while the other one failed to turn out well because of surrounding influences in which he was placed. Envoy Gerowe is very enthusiastic with the result of Juvenile Emigration. He said that while he met with some discouragements yet on the whole it was very encouraging and that Juvenile Emigration is building an Empire, which will stand for something in the future ages, an Empire which he will be glad to have helped to build. The Ottawa Free Press says: "The Montreal Star, having thought the matter over, has evidently decided to resume its attitude of opposition to the Laurier Government, in so far at least as the election of Hon William Pugsley at St John is concerned. To be sure, the Toronto World has dubbed it "the chief wrecker" of Conservative fortunes, and it certainly did more than its share to bring about the Tory rout in Nova Scotia in 1904. But, then, there is that "strong attachment" of "Zandray" which manifests itself in "gifts of money" to all the Provinces, not to speak of the special personal efforts of the sagacious "Zandridge" who acts for Parliamentary committees, to be taken into consideration. That is why the Tories tolerate the Star.

Referring to Dr Pugsley's straight challenge to Mr Borden to demand inquiry into his statement that the Tories had a campaign fund of half a million dollars at the 1904 elections and that the sum of twenty-five thousand dollars was sent into one County in New Brunswick (Westmorland) to compass the defeat of Mr Emmerson, the Montreal Herald entertains a doubt about Mr Borden's willingness to demand the inquiry. He gets quite angry when currency is given to Mr Graham's very frank statement of his disbursements of three, four, and five thousand a day "in the same way." He would doubtless be more angry still if all the other facts were to be brought out, including the story of disbursements by lovers of electoral purity in his own interest in Halifax. At all events, Dr Pugsley has given him the opportunity, and time will tell what use he makes of it.
