The Opposition in York.

The desperate straight in which the York County Opposition party finds itself was well illustrated last week at the Convention, called during Exhibition time, for the purpose of selecting candidates. Owing to the large influx of visitors, the Convention was fairly well attended, but a glance over the list of delegates shows that the party has scarcely improved since the memorable gathering of 1903, when the Gleaner, (then the personal mouthpiece of the present editor, but since sold body and soul to the Tory party) after viewing the assembled wisdom of the party, pathetically asked "Is this the state to which the Opposition has been reduced?" With the addition of a very few, including the Gleaner editor himself, it was the same convention, the same men present, and the same candidates put up. These "violent and impudent partisans," as the Gleaner called them four years ago, must surely still deserve the adjectives, even though Mr Crockett himself cheered wildly for them all, including the redoubtable King of the Nackawick, of whom four years ago it was publicly said in the Gleaner that no person in York County had any confidence in Mr Pinder. What has Mr Pinder done since then to ingratiate himself? Echo answers, What? Well did the Gleaner then say that the ticket was the laughing stock of the city, and it proved the biggest joke of the year, for the men of York snowed them under by a thousand majority.

The recent convention amply demonstrated the ascendancy of Mr James K Pinder, who as he did four years ago, again refused to be side-tracked, and forced the party to accept him. It mattered not that such men as Ex-Coun Grosvenor, Dr Mullin and Dr Morehouse were ready to take upon themselves the bearing of the party standard. The King was still on the throne, and reduced the malcontents to submission. Whether the friends of the gentlemen forced to stand aside will meekly submit to the machinations of the old discredited ring we cannot say, but this much is patent to all,—Any person who seriously contends that the York County ticket is a strong one, or that it deserves success on its merits, is most fearfully blind to the real facts.

An interesting feature of the day was the presence of Mr Pinder's bosom friend, Mr B Frank Smith M P P. We imagine their meeting must have been most cordial, and we see no reason why they should not "swap work" in campaign. The deep affection these men bear for one another is well known, and rumor has it that each is a candidate for the Public Works portfolio. Whew!

Ex-Coun Grosvenor Turned Down.

The SENTINEL, politically, is glad that the ring still rules in York, for one satisfactory result, in that sense, is the fact that Mr Pinder fills the place on the ticket which should have gone to Mr Hedley Grosvenor. Personally we are very sorry to see Mr Grosvenor's perfectly honorable ambition stifled in the heartless manner just shown in the house of his friends. Hedley Grosvenor has done more for the up-building of the Conservative party in York than any two men on the present ticket, and no man on the ticket is his superior as a representative citizen,—clean, fearless and conscientious. This much cannot be contradicted.

S Earle Allingham of the CPR staff Montreal having spent 1. st week with his parents, R L and Mrs Allingham, returned to his duties Saturday night.

Constructing the Transcontinental R.R.

Mr G O Dunn, district engineer of the Transcontinental Railway, gave an interesting account of the work being done on the New Brunswick division of the road to a Globe representative on Friday. Two sections of the route are already under construction, the first section, from the Quebec boundary to Grand Falls, a distance of 61 miles, the contract for which were allotted to Lyons and White, being well under way. Grading is being done more rapidly and there is little doubt the section will be completed when the time limit shall have expired, Sept 1, 1908.

On the section from Chipman to Grand Falls there are four parties at work making a final location survey. These parties are under Engineers D F Maxwell, A Foster, A E McDonald and H McNeil, and are now nearing the completion of their work.

A small section of road, from the 50th to the 58th mile near Chipman, has been contracted for by J W McManus and is now being cleared. Construction work will probably be commenced within a couple of weeks on this part and by the time the winter has set in its completion will be well under way.

The section from Chipman to Moncton, of which Engineer H M Balcom is in charge, has been located and it is expected contracts will be awarded in the near future. It is hoped that this section with others will be cleared by early next spring so that construction work can be rushed rapidly during the summer.

The great scarcity of laborers which has been so general throughout Canada during the past year, has held back the construction work that has already been undertaken to a considerable extent.

In addition to the work being done already mentioned there is a party at present under the direction of Mr M D Finlayson making borings at the Tobique river in order to determine the formation of the underlying rocks. Other work has been and is being done at the rivers on the section from the Grand Falls to the Quebec border, across which the new line must go. Concrete substructures, stone piers and other things are being prepared for new steel bridges.

It is the intention to rush all work as much as possible from now on until the frost gets too great and the heavy snow falls set in. Only the heavy construction work is to be continued through the mid-winter months.

Mr Dunn stated that it was the aim of the engineers to have the whole of the line under construction by the beginning of next summer. When questioned as to a probable time of the completion of the whole line through New Brunswick Mr Dunn said it was hard to say but hoped for it some time during the summer of 1909. Everything is in the hands of competent and experienced engineers who will do their best to see the work satisfactorily and well done.

The New Brunswick district of the work is at present divided into three divisions, the first of which, from Moncton to Chipman, Mr H M Balcom, who is assisted by a staff of six engineers, is in charge of; the central division from Chipman to Grand Falls, through which location surveys are being made by the four parties previously mentioned; and the third division, from Grand Falls to the Quebec border, of which Mr E Longley with a staff of six engineers is in charge.

Pugsley is Sanguine.

Speaking of the prospects of the Liberal party both in the Federal and Provincial sphere in New Brunswick, when interviewed a few days ago in Montreal, Dr Pugsley pronounced them eminently satisfactory. His own return by acclamation for a constituency which has formerly been Conservative was in his opinion the strongest possible manifestation of the goodwill of the people towards the present Government, as well as of appreciation of the wise and progressive policy of Sir Wilfrid Laurier. The Government of the Province of New Brunswick was in excellent hands and he had no doubt that at the general election whenever it might be they would receive a new lease of power.

They Paid Big Prices.

The Moncton Transcript says at one poll in Westmoreland Mr Powell's agents paid \$10 per head for votes in the last election. That's nothing to what was offered by Mr Hale's buyers in Carleton. Right here in town as high as \$25 was put up to loose fish in behalf of the Tory candidate, to say nothing of the lavish expenditure for whiskey, which according to sworn testimony, was ordered to be poured out by Hale's agents without stint in the 1900 campaign, and was.

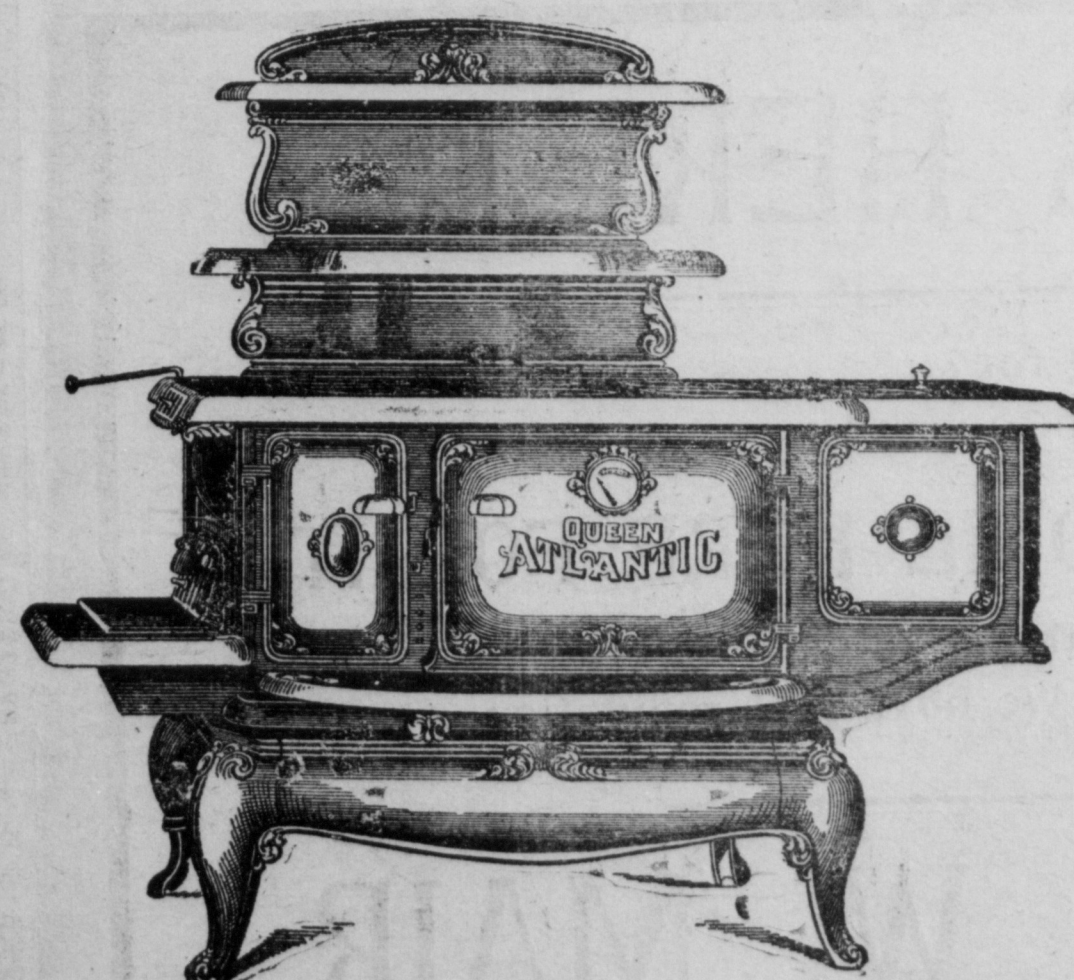
