There is some talk of starting a private telephone service in Woodstock. Parties interested are moving in the direction of securing incorporation, and in one of the papers there appears an advertisement warning citizens against signing N B Telephone Contracts. The new concern promises to supply phones at a very low figure, much under the new schedule asked by the monopoly.

If the truth were said, it must be confessed that the new and costly central energy system just installed by the N B Company is by no means a howling favorite in our town. The automatic, as it was in the days when the Union Telephone Co controlled it, is the system nearest to the local idea of perfection. This is what the new concern promises to give. If they put in a new line and render satisfactory service at a low price, the old concern will have to sit up and take notice.

The Teachers' Institute.

The Carleton County Teachers' Institute will meet in the new Consolidated School building, Florenceville on October 10th and 11th. An excellent programme is being prepared and it is expected this will be one of the best institutes ever held in the County. 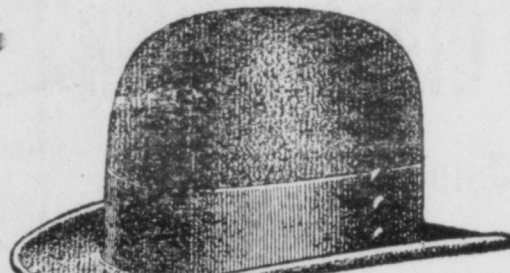
