Have they not the same right to employ a provincial distributor as has any other large manufacturer in any line you may please to mention? Such arguments as Mr Flemming is advancing on the school book question are extremely fallacious, and they are a fair sample of his whole windy political stock in trade.

Our good friend the Mayor of Woodstock, it seems, announced that he is no wobbler. Well, a great many can remember the time when His Worship was by no means such a pronounced tory as he now claims to be, but that was before greatness had been thrust upon him. ### OBSERVE SILVER WEDDING

Mayor and Mrs Jones of Rockland, Me., Entertained by Their Friends on Anniversary of Marriage.

Rockland, Me., Sept. 6.—Arnold H Jones, mayor of Rockland, was married 25 years ago today to Miss Caddie P Fisk of this city. The silver wedding anniversary was observed today, when Mr Jones' associates in the newspaper business gave them a complimentary banquet at Crescent beach. Mayor and Mrs Jones also received gifts as tokens of their friends regard.

Returning to this city the party was entertained at "Pickwick Place," the beautiful home of Postmaster W O Fuller Jr., who is also Mr Jones' partner in the ownership of the Rockland Courier-Gazette. There were about 50 guests, and the occasion was most felicitous.

The wedding ceremony 25 years ago was performed by Rev J J Blair, pastor of the Congregational church. W O Fuller Jr was groomsman, and Miss Lizzie Jones was bridesmaid.

Mr Jones is a native of Woodstock, N B, and served the old-time seven years' apprenticeship in the office of the Woodstock SENTINEL. He came to Rockland in 1876 and was for two years foreman of the Free Press office, under the late Edwin Sprague. In 1878 he entered partnership with W O Fuller Jr. publishing the Courier, which in 1882 consolidated with the Gazette. For 29 years he has been in charge of the mechanical department of that newspaper.

Mr Jones was chief engineer of the fire department six years, and the present fire alarm system was built under his supervision. He was also first assistant under the late H G Bird, accepting the appointment at the special request of that chief. Mr Jones is treasurer of the Rockland lodge, B P O E, a member of several Masonic bodies, Knox lodge, I O O F, Rockland lodge, N E O P, and the Catawamteak club.

Mrs Jones is a daughter of the late Moses Fisk, and is a native of this city. For quite a number of years she has been engaged in the millinery business. Like her husband she is very prominent in the city's social affairs.

Mayor and Mrs Jones have one son, Albert O Jones, who has a position with the Maine Central railroad. [Mayor Jones is a brother to R B Jones of this town.]

### Letter from Supt Dow.

During this season I have had some trouble which has been very unpleasant indeed.

Some patrons of the Maritime Dairy Co have evidently not been satisfied with the amount of the cream they have received from their cows and have taken unlawful means of increasing the value of the same.

I have at the instance of the Maritime Dairy Company made some investigations and have secured evidence against some who have been guilty of wrongdoing.

The system employed by those patrons has been to "doctor" the sweet cream which was offered the collector or else dilute the sour cream which is not sampled.

I have been able however to get an average sample of the whole amount in the cases that have come to my notice and made a careful test of the same. This was done without making any change in the regular way of collecting and taking sample, with the result that I was able to determine not only that an attempt had been made to defraud the Company buying the cream but I have been able to determine to what extent the same had been carried on.

I have reported the result of my work to the head office of the company and am taking this opportunity to warn any who have been making the grave mistake I refer to, or who might be tempted to do so in the future.

It is certainly regrettable that any man will place himself in such an awkward position and I am pleased to believe that there are very few of our farmers who will do such a thing, but while there are those who will do so we will have to do all we can to check them as I wish to see all patrons treated fairly and no man profit by that which does not belong to him.
