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

There were some funny phases. Perhaps the greatest mirth was let loose when A E Jones was at the bat Townsend sent a high one which took the popular ex-Mayor square on the beamer, knocking him down. Then again when Capt Bailey came to bat in the third wearing a hard hat with a crown 3½ inches high, of the vintage of 1841, red earbats and all, there was many a merry snicker.

Once more the genial ex-Warden shone in aristocratic headgear, appearing next time up with a doll's hat, and made a smashing safe hit. In the early stages the score was close, but about the mid inning the Brethren forged ahead with a comfortable lead. As the Even Fellows' pitcher took a kink in his throwing wing, Estabrooks was substituted at this stage, and shot them over like bullets from a gatling gun. Encouraged by Harry's superb twirling the Even-Fellows made a hair-raising finish. In their half of the last inning, with four to tie and five to win, it looked blue, but with a do or die look Capt Bailey's men went at it hammer and tongs. Capt Holyoke at third was "Johnny on the Spot" everytime, while Stevens held down second like a professional. Harvey put up a nice game all through. The game was a really exciting one. Charlie Jones umpired, and as he escaped with his life, must have given at least partial satisfaction.

The net proceeds, after defraying expenses for balls, dodgers, etc amounted to a five dollar bill, which went to swell the Hospital bank balance. There is a great deal of excitement over the game, so much that at least nine tenths of the spectators and all the players are anxious to see a grand nine inning contest some fine afternoon. 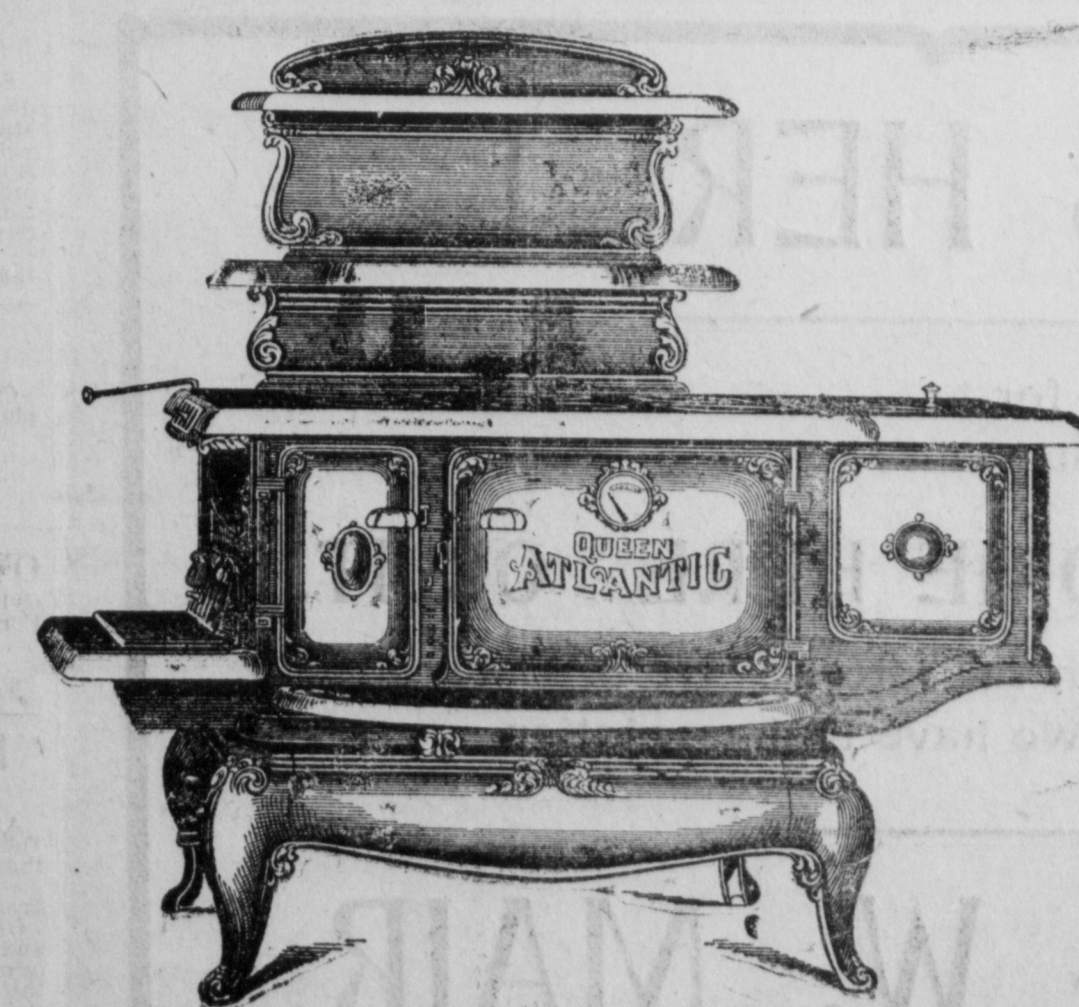
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
