The Town Council.

The regular monthly meeting was
held Monday night, all present ex-
cept Ald Dunbar. The Clerk being
absent, J. P. Maloney took the min-
utes.

H. W. Bourne, Town Treasurer, re-
ported Receipts during July amount-
ing to \$22,549.49.—Expenditure,
\$6781.74.—Credit Bank Balance Aug
5th, \$7835.28.

Owen Kelly, Chief of Police, re-
ported considerable collections on
back tax list and current licenses.
Bills were read as follows:—

On motion, all were referred to
the Audit Committee.

On motion of Coun Noble, second-
ed by Coun Fisher, the Assessors
were paid their salary for the year.

The Mayor read a letter from A. W.
Rideout, secretary of Hartland Fire
& Water Commissioners thanking
the Town for assistance at the time
of recent fire, and asking for bill. On
motion of Coun Sutton seconded by
Coun Noble, it was decided to make
no charge. The Mayor said he had
ascertained that the C. P. R. would
make no charge for the special train.

J. Norman W. Winslow sent in a
complaint respecting alleged dam-
ages to a lot on Charlotte Street and
also to the Lynch building on Main
Street. Referred to Street Commit-
tee. George W. Gibson wrote calling
the attention of the Council to the
balcony now being built by Mrs. Ired
Nevers on her building facing Reg-
ent Street. There was some dis-
cussion as to the proper course to be
pursued. Coun Burt jocularly re-
marked that the trouble was too
high up to come under jurisdiction
of the Street Com. It was finally or-
dered that the Street Committee
should consider the matter. Wm. Lee
and others dwelling along Union St
sent in a petition calling for water
service. Referred to Water Commit-
tee. On motion of Coun Hagerman,
seconded by Coun Sutton, R. S.
Welch's application for a year's re-
newal of his pool license was grant-
ed.

The Mayor called the attention of
the Council to the request of the
Public Meeting a few days back, re-
commending the Board to secure an
expert electrician, whose duty it
would be to examine the wires in
town. He said he had written ten
experts, asking terms etc. upon
which they would be willing to un-
dertake the job of inspecting the
wiring. A few had replied, and
judging from their letters, the cost
will approach \$75 per day. The
Mayor expressed surprise that the
Electric Power Co were not refrain-
ing from bringing the current down
Connell Street, pending rearrange-
ment of the wires. He had been in-
formed that they were not living up
to their promise. He said if high
current is kept on, all insurance in
Town would be cancelled, as he had
been informed so to-night by a gen-
tleman high in authority.

Coun Burt said he had been cen-
sured too long for silence on the
matter. If the Dam Co would not
temporarily close down he for one
would be willing to sign a petition
asking for an injunction to compel
them to do so.

Coun Hagerman said he had been
absent from the public meeting, and
was greatly surprised that anyone
should ask the Town to pay for an
expert. He said the trouble was
with the Company, who should have
hired more competent workmen.
He could not for the life of him see
why the Dam Company cannot be
compelled to bring a man here and
fix things up. He was strongly of
the opinion that the Company ought
to get the expert. As a citizen he
was strictly opposed to spending one
cent.

Mayor Munro. "Your claim may
be all correct, but there is weight in
the contra argument that the people
at large would have little confidence

n the opinion of a privately engag-
ed expert. I do not see how we can
get around hiring an expert and
paying the bill."

Ald Sutton. "There has been a
lot of talk about the town arc wires
being in bad shape and I think the
line should be fixed up. Personally
I am in favor of the Town and the
Company sharing the expense of an
expert. There seems to have been
at least a verbal understanding that
the Town should pay for putting the
arc wires in first class shape, and
the work should be done."

Mayor Munro. "Re the fire alarm
wires I have had a talk with Supt
Marshall as to the advisability of
transferring the line to the telephone
poles, and he estimates the cost of
labor at \$100. Any new material
would be furnished at actual cost.
I advise the Council to hire an
expert and pay him. This Council
should not adjourn to-night without
passing a resolution calling upon
the Dam Co to put the arc-light
wire in proper shape."

Coun Burt wanted to know why
the arc-light wires were not in good
condition. He thought the arc-
lights were good enough until the
Dam wires were put near them. He
for one would not vote for an expert.

Coun Fisher said the Power
Company was not altogether to
blame, as a great deal of the trouble
is due to the Telephone Co. He
thought the Power Co should not
bring high current down Water
Street.

Mayor Munro:—"The line down
Elm Street is not direct from the
Dam. It taps the main line at Con-
nell Street."

Coun Hagerman wanted to know
if it would be possible to force the
Dam Company to get an expert to
look over the situation previous to
turning on the current, and also
to compel them to hire an expert as
permanent local superintendent or
manager. He moved a resolution
dictated by the Mayor calling upon
the Company to hire a competent
electrical engineer approved by the
N. B. Fire underwriters to come here
to inquire into the condition of the
wiring of the Power Co and the
Telephone service, and also to em-
ploy some man with practical train-
ing as local manager.

Coun Burt as seconder suggested
adding a clause forbidding the
operation of the high tension wires
on Main Street south of Elm, which
was done. Carried unanimously.
Coun Sutton seconded by Coun Burt,
moved that the fire alarm system be
put in first class shape at once.
Coun Fisher said this would be a
big bill, as a lot of the wire had been
lugged off, not by the Power Co, but
someone else. The motion carried.
The Mayor said he had evidently
been laboring in vain in writing for
experts. He doubted if the course
the Council chose to take would re-
sult satisfactorily.

The school for the blind at Hal-
ifax is free to the blind youth of
Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Prince
Edward Island and Newfoundland.

The parents of partially or totally
blind children, and those interested
in the education of the blind will
confer a favour by reporting to the
Superintendent of the school, Dr. C. F.
Fraser, the name, age and address
of any boy or girl under twenty-one
years of age who is unable, through
lack of sight, to read ordinary print
and attend the public schools.

During the past year one hundred
and thirty-six pupils have been un-
der instruction in the School for the
Blind. Eight of those have recently
graduated and are now in a position
to earn their own living.

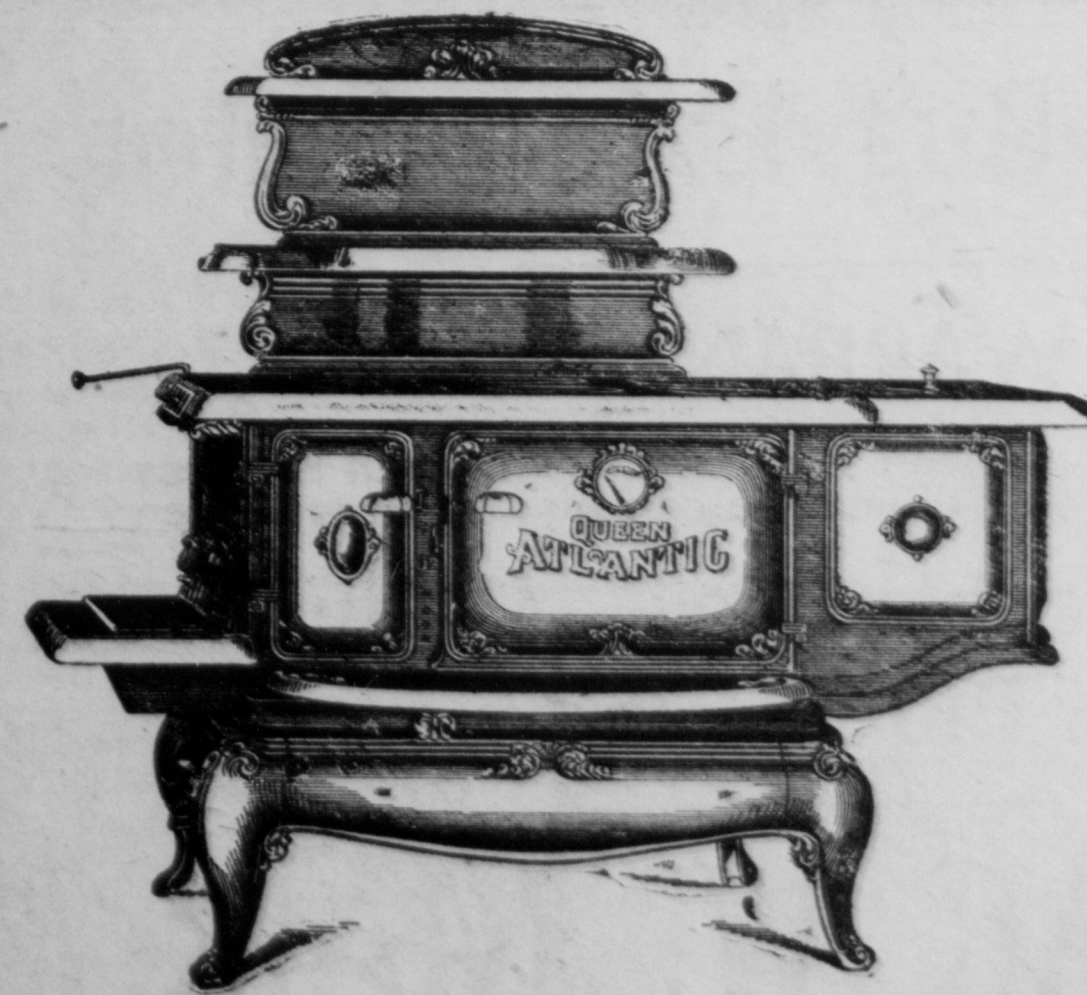
