The Bright People.

The results of the final examination for Teachers Licenses have just been announced. Carleton County pupils are as usual well to the fore. Miss Mary McManus of Woodstock and Miss Joanna Gallagher of Bath stand eighth and ninth respectively in order of highest marks on first class papers. Miss Mary Wetmore of this town secured twentieth position. On second class papers Miss Alma Havens of Jacksonville led the whole province, while Miss Hughina McCain of Florenceville, Miss Lillian Currie of Woodstock, Miss Nellie Gartley of Watson Settlement, Miss Meda Hoyt of Centreville, Miss Myrtle A Estey of Jacksonville, and Miss Geneva Shaw of Jacksonville all made over seventy per cent.

For Entrance to Normal School, Miss Annie P Jones of Bath, Miss Jennie L Darks of East Florenceville, Miss Lena M Wilson of Bath and Miss Zula Hallett of Millville made over 65 on First Class papers.

The Misses Rosa Perley of Florenceville, Clara B Jones of Bath, Lillian Shaw of Florenceville, Bernice Mallory of Jacksonville, Muriel McCain of Florenceville, Mabel Ebbett of Peel, Theresa White of White Glen, Alice C Tilley of Jacksonville, and Alice M Giberson of Bristol averaged over 60 per cent on Second Class papers.

For Matriculation, the results this year are very disappointing in numbers. Reginald McLean and May Gillin of the Grammar School secured second division. Master McLean is to enter McGill this fall for a course in medicine.

Miss Carvell a Winner.

The Tweedie Medal, for highest standing in the County of Carleton, in the High School Entrance Examination, has been awarded to Miss Mildred Carvell, daughter of F B Carvell K C M P, by the Chief Supt of Education, on behalf of the Lieut Governor. Miss Carvell's papers, on review by the special examiners for the whole province, were declared the most worthy in the County.

Climb Climbs Down.

Peter Clinch of St John was here this week and on Tuesday told a committee of the Directors of the Power Co that all insurance in town would be cancelled if they started their plant after 6 p.m. That night the Town was in darkness, the Connell Electric Light Co also shutting down its plant.
