### Prince Fushimi Delighted With I. C. R. Train Service.

EXPRESSES HIS GRATITUDE TO THE MANAGEMENT FOR THE SPLENDID ARRANGEMENTS FOR HIS JOURNEY.

Before leaving Canada for Japan, His Imperial Highness Prince Fushimi of Japan, instructed his Secretary to send the following telegram to the officials of the Intercolonial Railway:—

B., His Imperial Highness, Prince Fushimi desires me to express to you his warm thanks for the services of all the officials of the Intercolonial Railway on the train from Quebec to Toronto. Everything worked with the greatest smoothness, and His Imperial Highness much appreciated all the arrangements made to insure him comfort.

In discussing the Royal Train which the Intercolonial Railway placed at the disposal of His Highness on his arrival at Quebec, the *Toronto World* says:—

The Royal Train which created so much attention was composed of seven cars, occupied by a party of about forty. It was the first real Government owned train which ever arrived in Toronto, a fact which was remarked by railway officials. Five of the cars on the Intercolonial Railway which never saw Toronto before returned this morning to the blue nose regions to resume their usual grind as a portion of the regular equipment and service on the Intercolonial Railway, to which it may be said they are a distinct credit. They are the cars that are in ordinary use on the "Ocean Limited" and their general appearance is pleasing. The other two cars were those known as the Governor General's. They are the "Cornwall" and the "York" and were occupied by Prince Fushimi and his suite who were greatly pleased with the attentions to their comfort and expressed themselves accordingly. The Prince through his interpreters lauded the railway service. The Observation and Dining room on the Cornwall was very handsomely decorated with evergreens and flowers as was also the Dining car of the Intercolonial Railway.

### Big Bank Dividends.

(N. Y. Times)

Following its custom of dividing among the stockholders the accumulated profits of periods of unusual prosperity, the Fifth Avenue Bank declared yesterday an extra dividend of 150 per cent. in addition to the usual quarterly disbursement of 25 per cent. The bank's capital is \$100,000 and the regular and extra dividends therefore call for a disbursement of \$175,000. Two years ago the bank paid an extra dividend of 120 per cent., and in 1903 an extra dividend of 100 per cent. Since 1891 it has regularly paid 100 per cent. a year.

The first semi-annual dividend on the increased capitalization of the Chase National Bank was declared yesterday at the annual rate of 6 per cent. Last December a dividend of 400 per cent. was declared, by which the capital of the bank was increased from \$1,000,000 to \$5,000,000. The annual dividend paid on the \$1,000,000 capitalization was 20 per cent., and yesterday's declaration of a 3 per cent. increase of 1 per cent. over the semi-annual disbursement and of 2 per cent. in the annual rate. The dividend is payable July 1st to stockholders of record of July 18th.

Discussing the New Theology in a letter to *The New York Sun*, Mr. Goldwin Smith says: Constant dwelling on the idea of physical evolution, making us feel that we are not essentially other than a high development of the brutes, is debasing to the moral man; and we may be grateful to one who even gives another turn to thought. I must confess, however, that what the New Theology begets in me is sympathy, not conviction. I fail to see in anything more than a version of old Pantheism, conceived under the lingering shadow of Christianity, and recognizing Jesus as the perfection of humanity, our ideal and guide. "Jupiter est quodcumque videt," says a Stoic and Pantheistic poet of antiquity. In the New Theology it appears that for the Deity hitherto worshipped, the Creator, Father, Ruler and Judge, is substituted a being pervading the universe, including man, and identified with it, but under the necessity of self-limitation that he may consciously realize his own existence. Haecel would at once challenge us to produce any actual proof of the existence of such a being, and nothing that I can see in the manifesto of New Theology as it lies before me would enable us to meet his challenge. Special and peculiar views respecting morality and other features of the Dispensation dependent on the general theory would, of course, be involved in its rejection. Some of them seem to me extremely surprising in themselves. Born under the lingering shadow of orthodoxy, the New Theology seems disposed, not only to preserve allegiance to the Founder of Christianity as the great exemplar, which it emphatically does, but to cling to some parts of the miraculous Gospel, though in a rationalized form. Is this process to be commended? Miracle is an aureole woven by simple devotion around the adored head. It does not necessarily vitiate the rest of the history, but it is incapable of rationalization.

Hon. Mr. Foster.

The nomination of Mr. Foster in North Toronto may not be by any means the worst thing that could happen to the country. It has been evident for some time that the Conservative party had not the energy or the vitality to free itself from the association of a man who can now bring to it nothing but disrepute; and as the task of relegating the former director of the Union Trust Company to private life has to be left to the electorate, it is quite possible that North Toronto is as good a constituency to perform the task as any in Canada. It is absurd to suppose that the nomination really represents the desire of that consti-

tuency, even assuming that it is normally a Conservative division. Conservative nominations in Toronto are not made by the body of the electorate. But if the electors of North Toronto had arisen and declared that they did not care to have Mr. Foster present himself before them again, his influence over the party machine would very probably have secured him a nomination in another and perhaps a less educated constituency where party feelings alone might have returned him to the House. North Toronto, on the other hand, has had an intimate personal interest in Mr. Foster ever since his insurance operations became public. It has had to bear the responsibility of his persistence in public life. It knows if any constituency in Canada knows, all about his actions and their moral values; and it is not by any means the most partisan of constituencies now on the Conservative roll. It has now a function to perform both for the Conservative party and for the purity of public life in Canada, and we have considerable confidence that even the Conservatives of the division will do their duty.—*Montreal Herald.*

Mr. Roblin of Manitoba.

As perfect an example of detestable smugness as can be found anywhere is the utterance attributed to the Hon. R. P. Roblin, Premier of Manitoba, in an interview with the *Toronto World* one day recently, from which the following quotation is taken:—

Asked about his clerical critics, Mr. Roblin answered with his usual candor:—

"I have stated in public as prime minister that some of these gentlemen were not telling the truth. I pronounced them moral degenerates. No government in Canada has passed more restrictive legislation respecting the liquor traffic than ours. I challenge contradiction."

Those who know Mr. Roblin know that he represents the basest and lowest type of politician, and for him to give utterance to sentiments like the above but shows his utter unscrupulousness and degeneracy.

Incidentally, it may be mentioned that evidence of the general prosperity and improved purchasing power of the people is furnished by the fact that of \$364,900,000 of agricultural products, we exported only \$83,000,000, leaving for home consumption the large amount of \$281,000,000.
