## The Doukhobors.

Clothed in Sanctity, straw hats and night dresses thirty simple deluded Doukhobors passed through Mekinak, Man., Friday afternoon on their long pilgrimage to Winnipeg and the "warm country," where they expect to find Utopia, in which the sun always shines, and one does not have to eat meat or butter, but can live to a ripe old age on bread and onions. All the pilgrims were weary and foot-sore and many limped painfully with maimed and bruised feet, but pressed onward with an unshakable belief that they would soon reach a haven of rest. Old men, aged women and wee children, tramped by, side by side, but every face, young and old, showed an ineffable patience, tinged with joy betokening their calm assurance that they would only follow the command of the prophet.

"Where are you going?" they were asked.

"To a warm country," answered one of the women, who spoke English slightly.

"What do you want?"

"A warm country where no one must work—where one does not eat meat nor milk, nor butter; where one can live on fruit, and it is sunshine all the time."

"Where is this warm country?"

"We don't know."

"Who is leading you there?"

"No one but Jesus. Jesus walked and we must walk, too."

Then the whole band lifted up their hands to Heaven, and in their eyes there shone an angelic light as they broke into a hymn of praise. Louder and louder grew the volume of sound, the singers raising their arms with their voices, waxing more and more enthusiastic, they quickened their step and marched forward to their own music.

They sang, of course, in Russian, but it was not unpleasant to hear; on the contrary. As their voices rose and fell in a distinct harmony, higher rose the sound and wilder became their gestures, and then with a loud, triumphant shriek they ceased, exhausted.

Singing and chattering, they straggled, through the streets, begging for food. Meat and butter were refused; only onions and bread did they accept. Tuesday they left Dauphin and started for Orre River, where they arrived in the evening. They stayed there all night, but were not allowed much rest, as they were continually bothered by people whose curiosity had not been satisfied.

Saturday morning they left Orre River, and arrived at Mekinak, where they rested till two o'clock, eating their simple meal of bread and onions. They struck out again along the Canadian Northern for Winnipeg, where it is their intention to stop before setting out for the promised land.

In ten days they have travelled 150 miles, nearly half the entire distance, so at the present rate of travelling the band will arrive in Winnipeg a week from next Sunday. They have apparently no method in their madness. If mad they can be called. If they are not sane, their monomania is all the time harmless. They profess to be all equal and have no leader.

"We are all brothers, and are all the same one with another, and are following our Lord Jesus' example. He walked, and we must walk, too."

One aged man, one woman, who recently gave birth to a child, and four little children have preceded the party a few miles by train. These, with a few others, were so tired and worn out that they dropped exhausted by the road last week. The Doukhobors had \$8 amongst them, and with the money they bought the weaker ones tickets as far as the money would carry them.

Strawberries are ripe along the railroad, and on these the women and children try to sustain life, supplementing the fruit with a little bread.

The Doukhobors have left all their possessions behind them, except a few clothes and hunks of bread tied up in handkerchiefs.

It is a question as to whether this party is the only one tramping southward to the Promised Land. Reports state that other bands are on their way. Those who talk English in the band say they are several hundred more in Thunder Hill district, who will pack up and leave very soon, if they have not already left. It has been spread abroad that they are coming as naked as in their former pilgrimage of two years ago, but this time they are adopting slightly more rational methods, and under their blue smocks they have a few other pieces of clothing.

## Japan's load of Debt.

Japan's population is given officially as 48,864,000. Her revenue this year is estimated at \$308,200,000. The natural debt is \$1,100,000,000. About half of this debt most of which was incurred for war purposes, is in the shape of foreign loans. The internal loan of more than \$500,000,000 is mostly at 5 per cent. Of the foreign war loan \$107,393,000 bears 5 1/2 per cent., and \$122,037,500, is at 4 per cent.

In 1880 Japan's revenue was \$31,000,000; this year it is expected to reach \$308,200,000. Among the items of revenue this year are: The land tax, \$43,000,000; the liquor tax, about \$33,000,000; the customs revenue about \$18,000,000; the income tax, \$11,600,000; the "receipts from public undertakings and state property," \$63,380,000; receipts from salt monopoly, \$13,600,000; from tobacco monopoly, \$15,350,000; and railway profits, nearly \$12,000,000.

Japan's debt is large considering the per capita wealth of her people. The struggles with Russia cost her about \$600,000,000, and the interest on that sum cost her \$26,000,000 a year. The people pay with commendable patriotic self-sacrifice, but the sum taken from their earnings tells severely on a population whose per capita wealth is not, perhaps, over \$150. The nation is industrious and ambitious, however, and a few years of peaceful industry will do much to ease her of her load.
