### Georgia Letter.

Dear Sentinel:

Since I wrote you on the twenty-third of August our cotton has been very materially damaged by hot sunshine, hot wind, and lack of rain, but since Sept 1st we have had 3 1/2 inches of rain which has checked the inroads on our cotton by the hot sun and wind. Much of the crop will be about 3 1/2 per cent short. The staple is being harvested as fast as the weather and labour will permit, and what has been sold has brought a good price. From 12 1/2 to 13 1/2 cts has been paid up to the date.

The old lady I referred to in my last letter as being 88 years old and having a growth of child's hair, has since died, and gone to her rest beyond, where she will suffer no more pain nor death. She has paid the debt all must pay.

Last night was the first night this season that we felt as if one sheet was hardly enough cover to make us comfortable, yet it did not cool the hum of the few mosquitoes that put in their work under cover of night and the net, too, if they can gain an entrance. These are the same kind of a pest only not quite so large as the ones that used to test the thickness of the skin of us boys when we used to peel bark down below your town, in the woods of old Mr Beardsley, if I recollect correctly. My old friend, S J Parsons was a mere lad then, but he may recollect it as it was for his father we worked. But how many changes since that time. How much I loved that good old man and his Godly wife. She was like a mother to me. I presume the old Beardsley family are all gone too. As my mind runs over those long gone by years, I can hardly realize what desolation death has made among my old friends of years ago.
