MARGUERITE'S VICTORY.

Her Seventh One in as Many Starts This Season.

The enviable record of that grand mare, Marguerite, by Arclight, was added to yesterday by her brilliant victory in the 2.25 trot stake, which she won in straight heats. This 10 year-old mare which is being raced this year for the first time by James Gallagher, of Gallagher Bros., Woodstock, after others had failed to do anything with her, has started in seven races since the opening of the season and she has won seven first moneys in these seven races.

Yesterday she seemed just good enough to beat her field at any stage of the game, and truthfully speaking it can be stated that you need a trotter or pacer about three or four seconds faster than her to beat her, so consistently does she race and so steadily does she keep pounding away. Yesterday she had to first beat Axbell, then Belmar and then Miss Minto. It was horse racing all the time and the grey mare won partly because of her speed and partly because she went steady and kept pegging away all the time.

Marguerite in winning the race reduced her record in the first heat from 2.26 to 2.23, and then brought it down another peg to 2.22 in the second heat.

Some of the horses in this race showed an inclination to go very rough and to break at critical times. Whether this was caused by the track being heavy and the footing pretty soft it is hard to tell, but Belmar broke at the critical time when Driver Henry was bringing him up the stretch to the wire and Axbell broke when Tom Holmes seemed likely to make him head out the grey mare to the wire. Miss Minto also went to a couple of breaks in the third heat and John Ball broke repeatedly and paced quite a distance of one or two heats.

Marguerite was faultlessly driven by Mr. Gallagher and she seemed to be the favourite with the crowd or else her supporters were the most enthusiastic. She was cheered whenever she appeared on the track and Mr. Gallagher acknowledged the plaudits of the crowd by doffing his chapeau.

Some of the Halifax horsemen saw Marguerite race yesterday for the first time, and they were very much pleased with her work. Mr. Gallagher was the subject of congratulations from all sides, and was complimented upon his grand work in getting the mare in such fine shape to race. [Gleaner, 17th inst.]

Is the Banker Fair?

The banks are complaining of a shortness of funds and they are not able to give the accommodation thought necessary by the business community. Various reasons have been assigned. Some declare that the bankers are trying to raise the discount rate so as to increase their profits. This surely is untrue, since bank profits are so high now as to create a feeling of unrest among those who are always looking for an opportunity to criticize financial interests. Some claim that the bankers are hoarding money so as to check extravagance in living and investments. This is a more reasonable view, but taken by itself, it is improbable. Such a reason might be one element in the situation but it would not be the only one.

There is one feature which deserves mention in passing. The call loans outside Canada, to wit in New York, increased by seven million between April and June of this year. That is, at a time when Canadians were being told that the money was scarce, the bankers sent seven million dollars to help the speculators across the border. This is a feature of bank policy that cannot be too highly condemned. Possibly there is an explanation, but it has not been given. When these venerable bank managers talk at all, it is usually to harangue the people to be careful and not take any risks, they must meet commercial needs and conditions and meet them quickly if the country is to make headway.

It would seem but reasonable that the banks should be asked to recall some of that fifty-five millions they have in New York and use it to keep the legitimate industries and activities of this country supplied with the necessary funds for prompt transaction of business.—From the Canadian Courier.

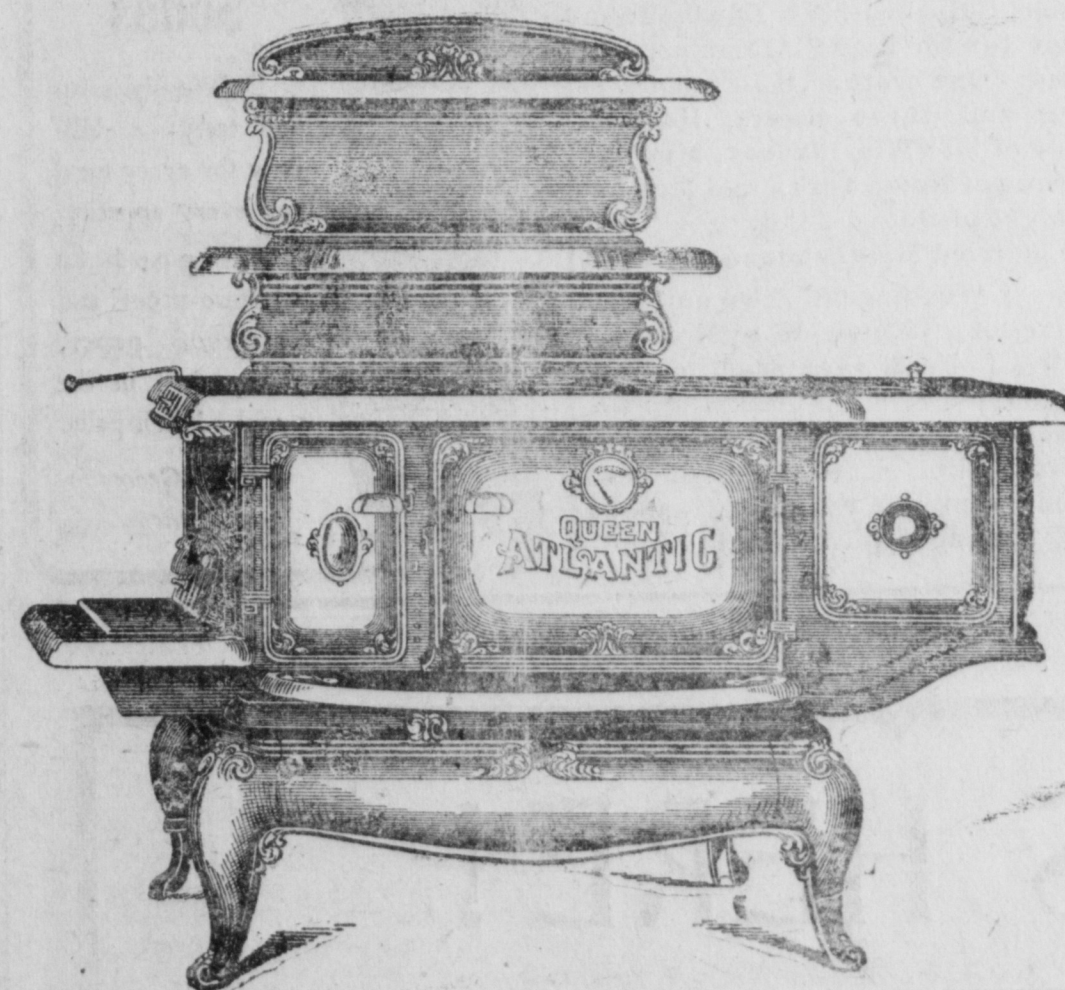
