The Provincial Finances.

It would appear that the old saying that those whom the Gods would destroy, they first make mad, is being exemplified by Mr Hazen and his lieutenants in their barn-storming tours through the province. In the discussion of the financial condition of the province their statements are so exaggerated and untruthful, that instead of creating alarm among the people as they hoped, they are only making them laugh. According to these opposition spouters the province is loaded down with debt, put on by this government of course, and on the verge of bankruptcy. They never stop a moment to consider how easy it is to prove the falsity of their statements by the public records, but trusting that their hearers will believe them and hear the truth, they scruple at nothing.

In the first place, our public debt is very small as compared with our resources, or that of other provinces. Our total bonded debt on the 31st of October last was \$4,541,719.19; cash assets \$529,299.99, with the Dominion government at 5 per cent interest, and sinking funds of \$147,907.04—total \$607,207.03, leaving the net debt at \$4,174,512.16, a sum about equal to the debt of the city of St John, which the government could wipe out any day by selling only a portion of our Crown Lands. This includes all the expenditures on the New Brunswick Coal & Railway Co., which will, in a very short time, be removed from the calculation by the sale of that road, and thus reducing the debt by nearly a million dollars.

Now, if Mr Hazen were to go to Manitoba, where there is a population about the same as this province, and where his political friends are in power, he might find some cause for alarm. There his friend Roblin has run the debt up to over \$20,000,000, in a few years.

The debt of the province, such as it is, is not the creation of this government. The life of this government dates back to 1883. For sixteen years previous to that Mr Hazen's political friends were in power, and after spending several millions of dollars in cash, allotted to us at the time of Confederation, gave away 1,600,000 acres of timber land to one railway company alone, and incurred \$2,215,700 of the bonded debt above referred to, the balance of which, \$2,626,019.10, was incurred by this government during its twenty-four years in power.

The old government did nothing to the credit of the province, they only spent until they got out. This government secured from the Dominion Government the eastern extension railway claim of \$280,000, which was added to our revenues. This very

year, as everyone knows, our government has secured an addition to our revenues of \$130,000 annually, a sum sufficient to pay the interest on the whole public debt. Besides this, our revenues are being yearly enhanced by the careful and intelligent manner in which our Crown lands are being managed, and by the attention to the preservation of our game and other sources of revenue.

Suppose that Mr Hazen's political friends had been in power during the last twenty-four years and had followed in office the course he has in opposition, what would have been the state of affairs. No fine steel bridges spanning our river, no eastern extension claim realized, no \$130,000 per year pouring into our treasury, the Central Railway a mass of ruts and Queens and Sunbury coal fields undeveloped. Because all these things, as well as every thing proposed by the government has been opposed by Mr Hazen. The share of this province in the Halifax fishery award is now being pressed by this government against the Dominion, with every prospect of success, but as a matter of course, opposed by Mr Hazen and his party. In fact the man is opposition mad and that is all there is to him. He seems not to have a single idea but to tear down and oppose.

That is not the kind of men this province wants at the head of affairs. This is not the age, nor is Canada the place for pessimists; we want no Jeremiahs going around beating the air and crying blue ruin. At best it is very mean business to be continually holding your country up before the world as bankrupt—even if true, but when it is untrue, as everyone knows, it is despicable.

However, no one need fear that Mr Hazen will have the opportunity of putting his opposition tactics into force. The people and their fathers before them have heard these dreadful forebodings of ruin and bankruptcy over and over again, and have come to rate them at their true value. They know that the men they send to legislate for them are among the most upright, honest and best business men in their respective constituencies, and Mr Hazen and his colleagues will find that they have set themselves to a very difficult task to convince them that they are corrupt, dishonest and without ability.

Mr Hazen, his colleagues and the press are making a great mistake if they think they can launch any kind of trash upon the people and they will swallow it without question. The experience of the last two general elections, which will be still more emphatically repeated before many moons, should have taught them better.

The Gleaner is shrieking for the appointment of an Attorney-General. Why all the haste? Is any interest suffering? Does the average man care a snap of the finger whether we ever have an Attorney-General? Perhaps if the Gleaner will name its selection the Premier will ratify the choice. Speak up, Bro Crocket.
