Elmwood.

(Too late for 1st issue.)

The weather has been quite warm
and springlike for the last few days
and the snow is rapidly melting
away.

On Wednesday March 20th we had
the worst snow storm we have had
this winter. Indeed I think it is the
worst which we have had for several
years. It began to snow on Tuesday
night and continued to do so nearly
all day Wednesday, and there was a
high gale of wind blowing all the
time. Traffic of all kinds was stopped,
even the trains being kept back.
The Houlton train made its usual
trip to Debec at seven o'clock on
Wednesday morning and went back
again to Houlton but failed to get
out at noon. About five o'clock that
afternoon a big engine and snow-
plow with a car containing fifteen or
twenty passengers, left Debec for
Houlton. About two miles and a half
from Debec they came to "Flemm-
ing's Cut" this of course was drifted
full and the train started to go
through but was unable to do so. It
only proceeded a little way when it
stuck fast and was unable to go
ahead and equally unable to back up
and there it had to remain. The
roadmaster was on board and he
started to walk back to Debec to
procure another engine and a crew
of men to shovel. One of the pas-
sengers started to walk with him.
The walking was pretty bad and
when they got to Elmwood crossing,
the passenger's strength failed and
he found himself unable to proceed
to Debec and he did not feel able to
walk back to the train so he made
for house of Mrs Taylor, a short dis-
tance from the track which he reach-
ed in a state of great exhaustion,
and there he had to remain all night.
The roadmaster went on to Debec
but failed to return with his relief
party until about nine o'clock on
Thursday morning. The car con-
taining the passengers was im-
mediately detached and taken back
to Debec by the newly arrived
engine, and a crew of men went to
work to shovel out the snow bound
engine. This they accomplished
about noon and she went back down
to Debec leaving the snow-plow in
the cut. About three o'clock on
Thursday afternoon two engines
with two cars attached came up,
fastened on to the snow-plow and
again endeavored to go through the
cut but they stuck again and one of
the engines broke something and
had to go back. The other engine
and snow plow forced their way
through after a good deal of hard
puffing. They succeeded in getting
through about five o'clock just
twenty four hours from the time they
started on the previous evening. In
a short time a special train with the
passengers, followed them and they
got through to Houlton alright and
the Houlton train made its usual
trip at six o'clock the evening.

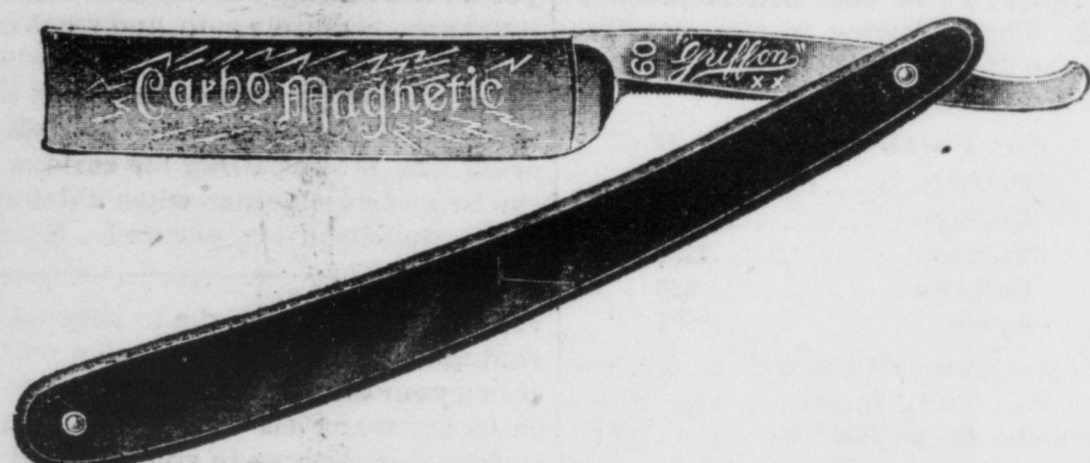
