### EASTER SERMON.

(Continued from first page.)  
council and afterwards receive me to glory." The conscience of Job demands a future life. He is dying unvindicated, therefore he knows that he shall see God after death. Thus we see immortality arises in the Hebrew faith when it reaches the height of personal, conscious fellowship in a righteous and loving God.

#### Future Life a Certainty.

Jesus was the "only begotten" son of the Father, and God had been revealed in his soul, as to no prophet or psalmist. He could say "no man hath seen the Father, but the Son and he to whom the Son will reveal Him." His fellowship with the father was uninterrupted and complete, and for that reason future life was to him an absolute certainty. Because of this He was able to interpret the inner meaning of the Old Testament scriptures and reveal the implication of the revelation of God which is recorded in these pages. Future life meant for Jesus that the fellowship He had with the Father would never cease. God would not forsake Him. He would not let him fail. The evil deeds and desires of men, united with the forces of nature could not rob him of the Father's communion, and thwart the holy purpose of his life. No, God will give him victory. He will rise from the dead. The Father will glorify him. This was a deep conviction in the soul of Jesus and it gave him strength to take his cross and die. Even in his life it was the glory of the future that gave courage for the present. Easter shed its rays on Calvary and in the strength of the resurrection life he trod the way of death.

#### The Mission of Jesus.

And it is only as Jesus leads us into his inner life and communicates to us the revelation of God contained in him that he assures us both of his resurrection and of our own. It is not possible for us to share in Jesus' faith in the future unless he leads us to fellowship with his Father. And this is the mission of Jesus; he reveals God to men and brings them into living fellowship with Him. He was not anxious to assure men of infinite existence, and to present a spectacular demonstration of life beyond the grave. But he did lead his disciples into the very presence of the Father, he revealed to them the very heart of God, and they understood as never before that God is Love. He called them to become sons of God, and as such, worth more than all the world, so that the very hairs of their head were numbered. What Jesus did was to spiritualize their lives; to give them a life so rich, so vital, so full of peace and power, so trusting in God and so dominated by the spirit of love that they lived the eternal life in time, and out of the life itself arose the conviction that their Father would never allow them to perish. And as Jesus did for them so he does for his followers to-day. It is often said that the Christian church rests on the resurrection, but that is surely a superficial statement. The Christian church rests on the resurrection of Jesus. It is not the appearance of Jesus but the appearance of Jesus that is of importance. At one time I said I regarded with distrust any attempt to build faith in the future upon an hypothesis that was scientifically dis-

credited, and a critic replied that I certainly did rest my faith upon the appearances of those who had died. One might say that in the case of Jesus the evidence came not from a handful of women who fancied that they saw him in the twilight, but from half a thousand men. But if the sum-total of our Easter faith was that a body of flesh and blood had been reanimated, and had been seen of men, it would scarcely be worth our serious consideration, and would bring no strength for the trials of life. But it is Jesus who lives after death. The Jesus who presented the highest standard of moral conduct that men have ever seen and, yet, who never fell below that standard. It is Jesus who overcame temptation and sin, who had power over disease, who brought the disciples into fellowship with the Father; the Jesus who died to redeem men, in obedience to the Father's will and in perfect trust that God would not fail him; it is that Jesus that lives. God did not forsake him; he did not fail. Death did not defeat him, or thwart his divine purpose and separate him from his Father's companionship.

#### True Basis of Easter Faith.

And the evidence, strong as it is, apart from the life which Jesus lived, and from the life which he inspires in our hearts, would never produce the Easter faith. Paul had heard the message that Jesus had risen, but it was not till God revealed his Son "in him" on the way to Damascus, that he got the Easter faith. When we examine the narratives of the appearances carefully it is difficult to gain from them a clear portrait of the risen Jesus. At one time he seems as he had always been, and they see the pierced hands, and then, again, they do not know him; and he passes through closed doors and vanishes from their sight. We cannot tell from these reports just how and where the risen Christ lived. But the essence of the Easter faith is that the Crucified one lives, raised by the power of God, and is yet, in fellowship with his disciples, and a source of power in their lives. And as Harnack says, "the conviction that Jesus lives grounds to-day the hope of citizenship in the eternal city. And where against the opposition of nature a strong faith in the unconditional worth of the soul is present, wherever death has lost its terror, wherever the suffering of the present is measured by the future glory there is an experience of life which is united with the conviction that Jesus Christ passed through death and that God has quickened him and exalted him to life and glory."

To sum up, it is as Jesus is the revelation of God for us, as He leads us into living fellowship with his Father; as he is risen within us that we are assured of his present existence, and of our eternal life. It is the Christ life within us, overcoming temptation and conquering sin, imparting strength for the day of duty and the hour of trial, that assures "the Lord is risen indeed" as "the first born among many brethren" and brings the assurance to our hearts that the Father who did not forsake him in the hour of death, will not leave to corruption all those who put their trust in Him. If we possess the Easter faith Christ is risen in our hearts this day and he speaks to us as he did to Mary at the grave of her brother, saying: "I am the resurrection and the life; he that believeth in me tho' he were dead, yet shall he live, and he that liveth and believeth in me shall never die."
