### MRS ADNEY'S CONCERT.

On last Friday evening an audi-  
ence which packed the Opera House  
to the doors listened appreciatively  
to a musical program admirably ren-  
dered by pupils of Mrs Tappan Adney.  
This is the first concert to which Mrs  
Adney has treated a Woodstock  
audience for a number of years and  
eloquently bespoke Mrs Adney's  
skill as a teacher of music, both in-  
strumental and vocal, besides giving  
us another opportunity to hear her  
own fine voice. The program was  
quite long, consisting of 31 piano and  
22 vocal pieces, but as was announc-  
ed at the beginning that there would  
be no "oncores," the program start-  
ing with the younger pupils and end-  
ing with the older ones was rapidly  
and smoothly run off. On account  
of some misunderstanding by which  
the caretaker of the Opera House  
failed to open the doors until half an  
hour past the appointed time, and  
which left Mrs Adney as well as the  
greater portion of the performers  
outside helplessly packed in the  
dense crowd of waiting people, the  
program was shortened by omitting  
several numbers. It was the first  
time most of the 23 performers had  
ever appeared in public and one and  
all they did splendidly, the little  
ones especially doing nobly and re-  
ceiving hearty applause. Owing to  
a severe cold Miss Barbara Walker  
was unable to sing with violin obli-  
gato by Mr Dickie. The two more  
advanced piano pupils, Miss Hender-  
son and Miss Grant, gave fine per-  
formances and marked evidence of  
talent that may be developed to  
great results, as indeed do several  
of the younger musicians. Miss  
Grant has been studying the piano  
less than three years. All the play-  
ers play from memory, that is, with-  
out the notes, this being a notable  
feature, as we understand, of Mrs  
Adney's recitals, such as those of  
the Victoria Conservatory of Music  
which became under her direction  
the foremost music school in Wes-  
tern Canada.

"The development of Miss McKib-  
bin's rich contralto voice was a re-  
velation to her friends and admirers.  
The three Rankin children, Miss Mar-  
gery and Masters Franklin and  
Donald made a distinct hit in "A  
Hundred Pipers."

Mrs Rankin's voice in "The Rose  
Bush" was never in better form and  
blended with great sweetness with  
that of Mrs Adney, who also gave in  
Italian from the "Barber of Seville"  
an exhibition of voice handling that  
was as remarkable as her "Mary of  
Argyle" was sweet and tender. The  
Italian song, it may be said, was one  
of Patti's favorites. The shortening  
of the program cut out two of the  
four pieces with two pianos playing  
in unison, which apart from its great  
effectiveness and novelty enables  
the audience to judge for themselves  
of the player's knowledge of the  
music. The two pianos, by the way,  
are said to have been personally  
selected by Mrs Adney from the  
stock of Goulay Pianos at Toronto  
for special use at this recital and by  
their richness of tone and beauty  
show convincingly that Canada is  
able to produce a piano second to  
none in the world.

### James N Farley.

Word was received on Tuesday of  
the death of James N Farley at For-  
tuna, California. The sad event oc-  
curred on the fifth instant, at the  
home of his daughter, Mrs Richard  
Pearson, with whom he resided for  
the past four years. Mr Farley was  
in his 84th year, and is survived by  
the daughter above mentioned and  
three others, Mrs John Pearson in  
California, Mrs S I Rogers of  
Gordonsville and Mrs Ambers Gib-  
son of Bristol, as well as two sons, —  
John of Bristol and S K of Wicklow.  
The deceased gentleman was well  
and favorably known in this county.  
He was for years a county councillor,  
representing Aberdeen, and after-  
wards Peel. He also was a captain  
in the Militia, and always took a  
lively interest in the success of the  
Liberal party. In religion he was a  
member of the Baptist Church.

### Quite an Industry.

Two enterprising gentlemen from  
Johnville, W J Gallagher and Patrick  
Gorey, are carrying on an important  
business at Clearview, in the making  
of wharf and ton timber. They have  
a crew of five men, and since the  
first of the year have got out about  
150 tons, and expect to get nearly 50  
more. Their teamster is John Pick-  
ard who has the honor of hauling  
tons at a single load, — the biggest  
ever brought into Clearview, or prob-  
ably any other station in the  
County.

### The Potato Duty.

The growing of potatoes is getting  
to be a great industry in Carleton  
County. Under the tariff as it has  
existed up to the present time the  
duty on foreign potatoes coming  
into Canada was 15 cents a bushel.  
It was felt by Mr Carvell, our re-  
presentative, that the Canadian  
market should be retained entirely  
for the Canadian farmer. With that  
end in view he made strong repre-  
sentations to the customs depart-  
ment urging for an increase in the  
duty. There was considerable op-  
position from the different provinces,  
as the people in Ontario and the  
West cannot grow potatoes success-  
fully or of such excellent quality as  
we do in the far eastern localities.  
In the Upper Provinces the  
people as a rule could not see their  
way clear to support the increase in  
the tariff, but in spite of their pro-  
tests Mr Carvell was able to place  
the matter in such a light that the  
government have raised the duty to  
20 cents per bushel, — equivalent to  
60 cents per barrel of 180 pounds.  
This 60 cents protection is certainly  
high enough to protect the Carleton  
County potato raiser from all danger  
of American competition. It is now  
absolutely certain that Yankee  
potatoes will not come into Canada.

### The Theatre.

Monday night's production, "The  
Finger of Scorn and the Proof of His  
Love," was well worthy of the big  
house that witnessed the perform-  
ance by The Valley Farm Dramatic  
Co, composed this year of Dr Currie,  
Oley Townsend, Harry Dunbar,  
Charlton Berrie, Arch Cole, Harry A  
Carvell, Mrs J Tilley Brewer, Miss  
Ada Boyer, Miss Estella Dalling and  
Miss Hattie Gabel. All the gentle-  
men did well, — in fact it would be  
hard to discriminate so uniform and  
excellent was the level of efficiency.  
Miss Boyer certainly sustained her  
reputation as one of the best am-  
ateurs ever seen in Woodstock,  
while Mrs Tilley-Brewer left nothing  
to be desired. Miss Dalling as the  
inquisitive old maid played her part  
to perfection, and Miss Gabel was  
entirely at ease as Bina, the servant.  
Miss Dorothy Brewer, who seems to  
have inherited a soprano voice of  
great range and sweetness, delight-  
ed the audience with a solo. The  
67th Regt Band was present, under  
their new leader, Prof J J Ansell,  
and gave a number of selections.  
The play is to be put on in several  
neighboring towns.

At the Convention held in Grand  
Falls on Tuesday Pius Merchaud  
was chosen as liberal Candidate for  
Victoria to succeed Senator Costi-  
gan. He will be an easy winner.
