The Premier Statesman of Greater Britain.

It must be a matter of genuine national pride to every patriotic Canadian that the Dominion has been represented at the Imperial Council, by a statesman of the clear vision and far-sighted wisdom of Sir Wilfrid Laurier. From first to last, Canada's Premier has been an outstanding figure and his influence has been dominant in the deliberations of the gathering, and this pre-eminence was natural and inevitable, because Sir Wilfrid's stand upon all questions under discussion was founded upon the cardinal principles of self-government which is the main-spring of the British Constitution and the glory of the British race in the Motherland and over-seas. The Canadian Premier admirably epitomized the principle upon which the British Empire has been built and shall endure, in the phrase "Imperial unity; local liberty," in his noble speech at the Guildhall—a deliverance which not merely awoke a responsive echo throughout the Dominion, but arrested the attention and compelled the convictions of the thoughtful men in every quarter of the Empire. Canadians indeed have ground for pardonable pride, that the Prime Minister in voicing the sentiments and convictions of his countrymen upon all questions, spoke with a sure sagacity and prudence that made his influence predominant in council and exalted him to a place of leadership among the statesmen of the Empire.

It is still more gratifying to Canadians that the Press of the United Kingdom, the great leaders of thought and exponents of popular opinion, have freely and almost with one accord recognized the sanity and foresight of Sir Wilfrid's views. Following the memorable ceremony of the Guildhall, the Sheffield Independent hailed as a happy augury of the success of the Conference the fact that its opening synchronized with a "real advance in practical Imperialism." Referring to the reduction in the postal rates on newspapers, magazines and trade journals from the United Kingdom to Canada, the Independent says: "This seems a little matter, but it is not a little matter. It means that British publications will have an advantage over the publications of other countries in transmission to Canada. Canadians will in future tend to read British rather than American journals; they will be brought into closer literary touch—using the word 'literary' in its broadest sense—with the Mother Country. The connection between what men read and what they think is self-evident. Hitherto the current reading of Canadians has not been British, but American. Newspapers and periodicals from the United States, trade journals from the United States, advertisements from the United States—these have so far held the field in Canada without dispute. Some of the popular English magazines have circulated in Canada, as they do elsewhere; but they have reached the Dominion by way of the United States, where the English advertisement pages have often been removed and American advertisements inserted in their stead. The alteration in postal rates will be valuable from a business point of view, since by means of trade journals and advertisements it will bring England and Canada into commercial contact with each other. It will be good from a political and social point of view, since it will aid Canadians to think in a British rather than in an American way—to view affairs from the standpoint of the Empire to which they belong, rather than from that of the Republic to which they do not belong. One could wish that the British news in Canadian papers came direct from the source, instead of flowing, as it mostly does, through American channels. That reform will no doubt come about. Meanwhile a new and powerful link has been forged—not without expense both to Mother Country and Dominion; but the expense is one that both alike are glad to bear."

The Independent then goes on to add this tribute to Sir Wilfrid, whom its styles "the most illustrious of all the statesmen of 'Greater Britain.'" "Let us now turn from this fulfilment of practical Imperialism to the promise of the Conference now assembled in London. The sittings were suspended yesterday to allow of the presentation to the Colonial Prime Ministers of the Freedom of the City—a notable ceremony of which the most notable event was the utterance of the most illustrious of all the statesmen of Greater Britain. No man has surpassed Sir Wilfrid in the breadth, the fervor, and the sanity of his thoughts on Empire and in the splendid eloquence with which these thoughts have been expressed. The dominant note of his noble speech of yesterday was one of trust in the Empire. The lesson of trust in the Empire is assuredly one that some who call themselves Imperialists have a prodigious need to learn. Because the problems of

Imperialism may be difficult, because there may be economic or other differences, why should we fear for the Empire? The spirit of the Empire is not a spirit of dissension; it is a spirit of unity. The Daughter Nations, said Sir Wilfrid, have come here with no thoughts of separation, only with thoughts of union and harmony. The Canadian statesman repudiated the notion that the Colonies had brought remonstrances; they had brought only good will.

"How poor and mean do partisan carping over the Conference appear in comparison with the true faith in Empire as revealed in the glowing words of Sir Wilfrid Laurier? Nor did Sir Wilfrid omit to emphasize the latest Imperial triumph—the conferment of liberty on the Transvaal. Under no other rule save British rule, he maintained, would such a happening have been possible; and he pointed to General Botha and Dr. Jameson sitting at the same table as Prime Ministers of British Colonies. It is the principle of freedom, and that alone, which enables the British Empire to achieve that which no other Empire would have dared to attempt. It was upon the theme of liberty as the Empire's foundation that Mr. Haldane based his brilliant address at the Eighty Club last evening. Liberty is the Empire's most cherished possession and its best safeguard. It is the pledge of unity; and since unity exists, why need there be fear of failure?"
