Still sticking to the Ministers, it is to be noted that Mr Lemieux has grown. His splendid Labor Disputes Act, however, is due to departmental initiative, and when the debating began the Minister was surprised to find that Mr Borden had much the better grasp of the general subject of compulsory arbitration. His postal rearrangement comes under the head of administrative rather than Parliamentary work, but it was a bold, a fine, and from Mr Lemieux's personal standpoint an unselfish stroke; it was characteristic in that Mr Lemieux is noteworthy in politics for an unusual bent towards intellectual interests. His most considerable Parliamentary feat was his reply to Mr Bourassa in the debate on immigration; on one restricted section of this topic, the question of attracting French immigrants to Canada, he scored a substantial triumph. Mr Fisher has made an unusually good session of it. He has been Acting-Minister of Public Works, and has got up the work of that great department with remarkable thoroughness. As a severe critic of Mr Frank Oliver in the past, your correspond. ent is bound to note that he is growing on the House. A conviction of the honesty of his intentions is gain ing ground, and that counts for much. His old violence of language breaks out occasionally, but the Conservatives have worked out a theory which enables them to bear it with great equanimity. These Interior Department scandals, they say, are his unpleasant legacy from Mr Sifton; he hates them as much as anybody else does, and they inspire him with an intense desire to abuse somebody.
