Baptist Union

To the Editor of Carleton Sentinel:—

SIR,—I noticed with interest your observations on Baptist Union in a recent issue of your paper. Although I am temporarily sojourning in the West, I am intensely interested in all matters touching the denomination to which I have the honor to belong—viz: the Reformed Baptist Church. Union sentiment is rife in our country at the present time. The prejudice and often fierce antagonism which marked and marred the relationship of old-time religious bodies, now appears not only unchristian but out-of-date and absurd. Much of difference between the United Baptists and the smaller denomination of Reformed Baptists is the result of misunderstanding. There are some differences of belief and teaching, and while these are important they are not such as to render union impossible. I would regard it as an excellent idea that representatives of the two bodies should meet and frankly confer in regard to the matter. A basis of organic union may or may not be found, acceptable to both parties, but at any rate a better understanding of one another would probably result, and a more sympathetic union of effort is easily possible. By all means let us talk matters over with all christian courtesy and with earnest desire to promote the cause of Christ. Thanking you for your space, I am

Log Stealing Case.

An arrest was made by Sheriff Foster at Bristol on Friday evening of last week, which promises sensational developments in the near future.

One Tise Dyer for a couple of weeks had been rafting logs near Bath and Bristol for B Frank Smith M P and Friday afternoon completed a raft of six joints five of which were very inferior small white spruce, fir and poplar purchased by Mr Smith from a Mr Giberson below Bath. The sixth joint contained 20 splendid spruce logs picked up in the River, some of which were old logs entirely clear of bark. Most of the logs were plainly marked, although the marks had been removed from them with an axe. There were also 6 large spruce rafted in the first five joints, which were picked up in the River. On Friday afternoon Mr Smith and Major Tompkins surveyed the whole six joints. Later in the evening Dyer was arrested and taken to Simonds. The Sheriff drove back in the night and awaited developments. Shortly after daylight, Mr Smith personally appeared on the scene to run the raft when he was prevented from so doing by the Sheriff. He at once admitted that the 26 River logs were not his and wanted to cut them adrift, but the Sheriff thought best to save them and haul 20 of them out on the shore where they are now. Mr Smith admitted that he purchased these logs from Dyer at 50 cents each.

Mr Smith met Dyer at Florenceville on his way up Saturday and advised him to plead guilty and when the Sheriff arrived at Bristol with Dyer, Major Tompkins met him and tendered the same advice, but the representative of the Log Driving Co. thought the case was of too much importance to be so summarily disposed of. The examination was adjourned until Wednesday 22nd inst. Shortly before the hour fixed for the examination, Dyer, who was out on bail, went down to Florenceville, and after consultation with his friends, skipped for Bridgewater, and after waiting for more than an hour for his arrival, Justice Farley adjourned the hearing to Friday of next week. The Log Driving Co. intend investigating the case to the bottom, as there was a very strong feeling last year that everything was not right along the River through some portions of Carleton Co. and this year they started at the beginning of the rafting season, and were not long in locating at least a portion of the trouble.
