The Lord's Day Alliance.

A mass meeting under the auspices of the local branch of the Lord's Day Alliance was held Sunday afternoon in the Reformed Baptist Church. Lieut. Colonel D. McLeod Vince occupied the chair. Seated beside him were Rev. Dr. W. C. Keirstead and Revs. R. G. Falton, G. D. Ireland and A. Hastings Kearney. Prominent men in the audience were His Worship the Mayor, Ald. Fisher, Ald. Burtt, Postmaster Smith, Rev. Mr. Lepage, Rev. Mr. Blakeney, Dr. I. W. N. Baker, Dr. J. E. Jewett, C. N. Scott, Robert Kennedy, Alex. Henderson, John A. Lindsay, H. H. Lockwood and Elder Colpitts.

After a short song service, led by that gifted singer, Mr. F. L. Mooers, and prayer by Elder Blakeney, the chairman called upon Elder Kearney as the first speaker. Mr. Kearney said the Sabbath was becoming too much like the so-called Continental observance in the Eastern Hemisphere. To him there seemed to be something in the number "seven." Even machinery does better work in the long run by resting one day in the week. He read the salient provisions of the new Lord's Day Act, and also extracts from a tract published by a preacher in U. S. To his mind Christians should not permit business or visitors to interfere with church attendance.

Rev. Mr. Falton said the work of protecting the Sabbath is as old as the world itself. Ever since Creation the day of rest has been a factor in life. He had heard the criticism that the reason the ministry agitates so much in favor of Sabbath observance is the fear of losing their support. There could be nothing in the cry, because ministers were not out for making money, because almost any clergyman could get more money in some other walk in life. It was part and parcel of the Christian duty to guard the Sabbath. Some folks had accused the speaker of narrow spirit in opposing the suggested series of Sunday afternoon sacred Band Concerts, and on that account accused him of being a puritan. He thanked God that there is yet some degree of puritanical feeling, in order to keep the thin edge of the wedge of Sabbath desecration out of the moral fabric of the community. As for workmen, he was satisfied that all would welcome the provision calling for a clear 24 hours rest in each week. The C. P. R., said he, were breaking the law by hauling lumber on Sunday. That very morning, from 6 to 9, load after load of lumber was sent away from the Lower Station. Surely the company could not call lumber perishable freight. Men had told him the reason they failed to attend church was on account of the fear of losing their position if they refused to work on Sunday. The speaker said he would not wish to be termed narrow on the question of Sabbath observance, yet he could not permit desecration to continue without a protest.

Rev. G. D. Ireland said in so far as the Act protected the workmen, he was entirely in accord with its provisions. Inherent human nature needs rest. In so far as he was personally concerned, he had no sympathy with pharisaical observance. In his opinion legislation should not be coercive. Moral suasion and the teachings of our blessed Saviour were far better than drastic legislation. He wished to protest against the habit of keeping certain business places open on Saturday nights to a very late hour. The practice made the clerks utterly unable to worship in the morning. It was a self-evident fact that in six days as much work could be done by a workman in fit condition as in seven when the employee is tired and needs recreation. There should be a reasonably early closing hour for Saturday nights. Even if rolling stock be scarce, the C. P. R. should be looked after for Sabbath violation, but it is no part of the clergyman's duty to act the part of a policeman or a detective.

Rev. Dr. Keirstead said the interpretation of problems from the point of view of Jesus Christ was the proper manner. The Sabbath suffers on the one hand from love of money. There was also too much of the pharisaical element among those who defended the day. There is an undisputed right to secure for those who wish it, a rest on the Lord's Day. The pharisaical idea leads men to forget that the Sabbath was made for man, not man for the day. There is an element of serious danger in forcing too narrow limitations. We should not forget the answer of our Saviour when he said that every day is holy. Men should behave themselves at all times. It must not be forgotten that one of the very things that brought Christ to Calvary was violation of a pharisaical Sabbath law. To him it seemed as if the Sabbath observance is often done. To many, particularly children in certain homes, Sunday must be the most lonely day of the year. The blessed day is often too crowded with church worship. There should be more home communion,

and less formal observance. Like all others who have the proper observance of the day at heart, he must protest against the spirit of commercialism which tends toward sweeping away the Sabbath.

Colonel Vince said he had heard considerable of the puritans. It must not be forgotten that whatever measure of freedom we possess is due primarily to the men who came to America in 1629-32 and laid the foundation of freedom in the New World.

He felt as if the desire for pleasure on the Sabbath was not wholesome, for in every instance pleasure leads to work of some sort, and Sunday labor entails violation of God's laws. The proper attitude for the Christian is to discourage worldly pleasure on the Sabbath.

Elder Kearney then made an appeal for funds to carry on the work, after which the benediction was pronounced by Elder Colpitts.

Canada's Own Financing.

TORONTO, May 24.—The World is enabled to state on the best authority that the proposal to send a delegation to Europe to negotiate the \$5,000,000 loan authorized by the Provincial Legislature which the City Council recently empowered the finance committee to do at its discretion has been abandoned and that no delegation will be sent indeed there will be no emissary of the city sent even to New York. The loan will be negotiated here and in Montreal and the money will come from Canadian finance houses and not from France, England or the United States.
